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

A RAILROAD CASE .- Some excitement was produced in our village, one day last week, by a report that Mr. John Davis was "tearing up the track at the Lower Depot." Mr. Davis is a respectable young mechanic, known from childhood in our village, against whose good character nobody ever whispered ; and it was only after deliberate inquiry into the case, that people saw that there was method in whet had seemed like madness in the young man. It was found that instead of injuring the track, he was only removing the platform, and with careful reference to the boundaries of land he owned on each side of the road. Remonstrance and persuasion, with a slight sprinkling of threats, produced no effect, and in the course of the forenoon Mr. Davis seemed to have finished his job according to his plan. Orders come from Augusta for his arrest, but nobody here thought it duty to meddle with him ; and on the following day he was quietly taken to that place on civil process, where he gave bonds for his future appearance for trial, and returned home. He had acted under the advice of legal counsel.

Further examination of circumstances, added to what was before generally known, has awakened marked sympathy for Mr. Davis and his family, under the wrongs they claim to have suffered from the Somerset & Kennebee Railroad. "On whichever side rests the legal aggression, it is well known that great suffering has resulted to a family now consisting of a widow and her four children, of whom the actor in the above case is one. At the time the road was laid out, Mr. Jonas Davis, the husband and father, owned a neat little home on the bank of the river, consisting of a cottage, carpenter shop and barn. It was the saving of years of labor, and constituted his all. It was necessary that the road should have a pass through this property, and it was so taken as to cut out the shop and barn, leaving the naked house on one side and a worthless strip of land en the other. Mr. Davis, in the face of his known helplessness, protested against this tearing process, and offere I to sell the property at a price which the road declined. The extreme excitement produced by this case upon Mr. Davis, added to previous infirmity, led to occasional periods of mental aberration, at which times his rage against the authors of his. real or fancied wrongs mastered all prudence; and during one of them he was charged with some attempt to destroy the property of the road. He was taken to Augusta,-and while there removal of his shop and barn was effected by the officials of the road. Mr. Davis claimed that they also took his tools, stock and fixtures, in violation of his legal rights, and for which Davis was found one morning upon the ice under the railroad bridge, dead-having, as was supposed, fallen through its timbers and broken his neck.




