RUNAWAY HORSES. — The free wild horse on the prairie, or the rarer on his way round the course, may be objects of admiration; but nobody likes to see a runaway horse with a wagon or truck cart at his heels, "putting it" through Main-street, as though the ghost of Tam O'Shanter was after him. From our window we often see this performance; but never without thinking that the man who leaves his horse to stand in the street without hitching, deserves to see him break his neck. He may have a moral right, he has not a legal one—to risk his own property, but not that of others, or the lives of the persons always more or less exposed. His carelessness is not merely a venture of his own; it is a violation of law, and a trespass upon the rights of others, for which he should be held accountable. The law against such recklessness of life and property is a good and necessary one, and our village police ought to enforce it.

THE MAY FLOWERS, and Miscellaneous Writings. By the Author of "Uncle Tom's Cabin," "Ghosts, Spectres, and Foreign Lands," etc. Boston: Phillips, Sampson & Co.

A new book by Mrs. Stowe will be welcomed by every one, for she is known everywhere and every where a favorite. This is a handsome volume of four hundred and seventy pages, filled with stories and sketches illustrative of New England domestic life and manners, and though many of them have seen the light before, yet as they were published are Mrs. Stowe's best sellers, very likely they will be now to most readers. The stories are told in a way few could imitate, and are generally pervaded by a vein of true, natural humor, though occasionally the reader will find his eyes moisten in spite of himself. It is a healthy, entertaining book, and will "do good like a medicine." The volume is ornamented with fine pictures of the author's, from the Richmond portraits, and some poems are attached to the work, which though unexceptionable in sentiment, are as conclusively that she is not called to write poetry, as her extravagant admiration of Dr. Watts' hymns proved her an incompetent judge of the article when manufactured by others.
