CONTRIBUTORS TO THIS ISSUE

JODY ALLENRANDOLPH'S essays on Irish, English, and American poetry have appeared regularly over the past ten years. She is currently finishing the last of a series of comprehensive bibliographies on Eavan Boland, Derek Mahon, and Michael Longley, and is at work on a book on the sixties generation in Irish poetry.

EAVAN BOLAND'S most recent volume of poetry is *The Lost Land* (1998). She is Director of the Creative Writing Program at Stanford University,

where she is a professor in the English Department and Melvin and Bill Lane Professor in the Humanities. She is co-editor with Mark Strand of *The Making of the Poem: A Norton Anthology of Poetic Forms*, forthcoming in Spring 2000.

CATRIONA CLUTTERBUCK lectures in the Department of Anglo-Irish Literature and Drama at University College Dublin. She has published articles in the *Irish University Review* on Derek Mahon and Brian Friel, and is currently working on the critical contexts of Irish women's poetry.

ANNE FOGARTY teaches in the English Department at University College Dublin and is Director of the James Joyce Summer School. She has published essays on a range of Irish women writers, including Kate O'Brien, Lady Gregory, Mary Dorcey, Mary Lavin, and Maria Edgeworth. She is editing the CQ issue on Irish Women Novelists which will appear in June 2000.

ALBERT GELPI is William Robertson Coe Professor of American Literature, emeritus, at Stanford University. His books include *The Tenth Muse: The Psyche of the American Poet, A Coherent Splendor: The American Poetic Renaissance 1910-1950*, and *Living in Time: The Poetry of C. Day Lewis.* He is working on the third volume of his critical history of American poetry, *Postmodernism and Neoromanticism: American Poetry Since 1950.*

MARY O'MALLEY has published three collections of poetry—A Consideration of Silk (1990), Where the Rocks Float (1993), and The Knife in the Wave (1997)— and is at work on her fourth. Her play An Striapach Allurach was commissioned by the national Irish language theatre, Amharclann de hIde, in 1997.

MICHAEL THURSTON is Assistant Professor of English and Fellow of the Whitney Humanities Center at Yale University. He has published a number of articles on twentieth-century poetry and is at work on a book on history and ethics in the twentieth-century lyric.
