DOUGLAS ARCHIBALD, Roberts Professor of Literature at Colby, has edited *CQ* since 1986. His publications include books on John Butler Yeats, W.B. Yeats, and essays on Burke, Swift, and the nature of literary influence. He is co-editor of Yeats's *Autobiographies*, volume III of *The Collected Works*.

DENIS SAMPSON teaches at Vanier College, Montreal, and has written books on John McGahern and Brian Moore and essays on contemporary Irish fiction and memoir. He has recently published memoir essays and been a Maclean-Hunter Fellow in nonfiction at the Banff Centre for the Arts.

MARY FITZGERALD-HOYT is Professor of English at Siena College. She has published essays on Irish authors, including Boland, Carson, Grennan, Trevor, and Friel. *William Trevor: Re-Imagining Ireland* is forthcoming from the Liffey Press, Dublin, as part of its series on contemporary Irish writers and filmmakers.

CHRISTINE ST. PETER is Professor of Women's Studies at the University of Victoria, Canada. She has published on Irish drama; Canadian, English, and

Irish fiction; and women's health issues and oral history. Her recent book, *Changing Ireland: Strategies in Contemporary Women's Fiction*, was named one of the outstanding academic books of the year by *Choice*.
