Inspired by a great new coach, "Nels" Nitchman, and possessing exceptional material, the Colby White Mules clinched outright the Maine State Series Title for the first time since the 1923 season. Meeting keener competition than in 1940, the team did not acquire as good a record as that of the preceding year, but they did rise to greater heights. The only blemish on their series record was a 13-13 tie with the University of Maine. At the time this tie seemed ruinous, but fortunately it was not insurmountable.

The season got under way on Seavern's Field with Colby testing Coach Nitchman's single-wing formation for the first time against a strong C. C. N. Y. club. Apparently scoring at will, Colby took a quick 14-0 lead in the first five minutes of the game, only to be overtaken and set back by the New Yorkers to the tune of 20-16. Sophomore Ray Verrengia and 1940 All-Maine hack Bobby LaFleur scored the touchdowns for us while Eddie Loring kicked an extra point and a field goal for the remaining points.

The second game of the season proved to be just as hard a nut to crack. Norwich University, led by All-American candidate Walt Domina, invaded the Mules' stamping grounds and walked off with a 21-7 victory. The score alone, however, should not be taken as a criterion of the game. Colby, while pushing Norwich back repeatedly, held a slight advantage for much of the game but weakened late in the third period to give the visitors the victory. Wendy Brooks' touchdown and Eddie Loring's placement scored seven points for the Mules.

Vermont, barely edged by the '40 team, proved not too high a hurdle, and was easily defeated 13-0. Three sophomores, Phil Caminiti, "Bud" Mc-Kay, and Ray Verrengia stood out in this game, with Phil scoring both touchdowns.

The first game away from home held no terrors for the Mules. The Middlebury Panthers went down 18-6, by virtue of scores by Caminiti, Captain Helin, and LeFleur. However, this victory proved costly as Henry Rokicki

was carried from the field with a twisted knee that kept him inactive during most of the remaining games.

The State Series opened with Colby meeting Bowdoin at Brunswick. Supposedly much weaker than in 1940, Bowdoin offered stiff competition. It was not until Brooks broke away for a beautiful 30-yard touchdown run, and "Scooter" Scioletti plunged over from the two-yard line, that the game was clinched for Colby. Eddie Loring converted after both touchdowns. The injury jinx struck again during this game. Lou Volpe, destined to be the '42 captain, wrenched his knee so badly that he was lost to the team for most of the year.

Returning to Seavern's Field, Colby met a strong University of Maine team which kept its lead through the whole game until a never-to-be-forgotten last two minutes. With Phil Caminiti and Ray Verrangia alternating, the ball was brought to the 28. A pass carried it to the 13, and from there Caminiti sliced off tackle into the end zone, standing up. This score was not enough, however, as Colby still trailed by seven points, and it was not until the last two minutes that the team once more came to life. With the ball practically in mid-field, and a drenching downpour making passing virtually impossible, LaFleur was sent in. His two long throws to Bubar brought us six points nearer, and only one point behind as the overflowing stands went wild. With about a minute to go, Eddie Loring cooly booted the ball between the uprights to give Colby a much needed tie and a chance for the title.

The two league-leading teams came together on Armistice Day. The Bates Bobcats were the first to score on a 60-yard breakaway run, the effects of which did not dampen the Mules' spirits in the least. In the third period, Verrengia plunged through to the 29, was hit, lateralled to Brooks, and the latter scampered for a touchdown. Loring not only came through by tying the game with his place kick, but in the last period he intercepted a Bates pass on his own 40 and ran it back for a victory score, and the first State Series Title in 18 years.

The successful 1941 season may be attributed largely to the addition of a fine group of sophomores to an already experienced and talented squad. The backfield knew no regular line-up due to the wealth of material available—Ray Verregnia, Phil Caminiti, Bud McKay, Bobby LeFleur, Danny Scioletti, Jack Stevens, Henry Rokicki, and Wendell Brooks.

These backs worked behind a line composed of such fine players as Helin, Wood, Weidul. Hutcheson, Liss, Volpe, Shiro, Turner, Puiia, Bubar, deNazario, and Hegan. Such a listing certainly qualifies the Mules' squad of '41 as one of the outstanding teams in Colby football history.

It was Friday the thirteenth and, with less than half their games before them, the Mules rested securely in second place in the New England college rankings. But it was a fateful Friday the thirteenth, for that night they traveled to Orono to meet the Black Bears of the University of Maine and were defeated, 44-42, in the waning seconds of the second overtime period of as hotly-contested a ball game as state series followers have seen in many years. Tied up at 37-all at the end of the regulation forty minutes, both teams resumed hostilities after a short rest period only to remain deadlocked at 39-all after the first ten-minute overtime. In the second extra session the teams seemed determined to make a marathon of the contest with the score standing at 42-all and only seconds to play. Then a Maine substitute slipped through the tight Colby defense and sank a lay-up shot that ended the game and set back the Mules for the first time in seven starts.

With only Johnny Lomac and Captain Oren Shiro returning from last year's championship team, Coach Roundy was faced with a tremendous task. Yet the first game on the schedule with Providence College left no fears that Colby's fine record of last year would be tarnished. With sophomores Benny Zecker and Mitchel Jaworski showing the way by piling up ten and sixteen points respectively, Providence was hard pressed to eke out a 55-54 win. Lomac left no doubt that he was picking up his scoring habits just where he left them last season by sinking fifteen points, thirteen of which came in the last half in an all-out effort to bring victory.


Hitting the road, the Mules continued to threaten the uncertain balances of their followers by taking Trinity by one point, 46-45, and Wesleyan, conqueror of Harvard, the following night by a slightly larger margin, 37-34. A loyal band of Colby rooters welcomed the team to Connecticut and provided moral support. Zecker and Lomac continued to be the scoring threats, contributing thrity-three and seventeen points respectively in two games.

The state series opened in earnest when Bates played host at Lewiston after St. Anselm had fallen before the Blue and Gray wave in another close contest, 30-29. But there was no doubt about the decision over the Bobcats. Jaworski, Zecker, and LaFleur put their thirty-eight points with those of the rest of the squad to amass a total of fifty-three to Bates' thirty-seven.

Bowdoin entered their first state series play on the court disastrously. The Polar Bears' inexperienced outfit did well to hold Colby to a 46-23 decision. Then the University of Maine fell prey to "our boys" in the first encounter when late baskets by Zecker edged them, 38-35.

A new scoring star was uncovered in the Boston University game, when diminutive sophomore "Lock" Jennings, who was put in to fill the gap left when Bob LaFleur was drafted, scored fourteen points, and generally made it a bad evening for the Bostonians with his sparkling defense and stolen passes. It was after this victory that Colby was ranked second only to Providence in New England, topping such schools as Rhode Island State, Dartmouth, Brown, and Harvard in the standings. Then came the debacle at Orono and the Mules returned to Waterville only to absorb their worst drubbing of the past few seasons at the hands of the smooth-passing Tufts team, 34-24.

Second Row, left to right: Coach Roundy, McAullum, J. Calahan, R. T. Westcott, Caminiti, LaGassey, Alexander.



The Colby spirit proved unquenchable, however, and the Mules bounced right back into the win column several nights later when Northeastern's Huskies invaded Waterville. One of the most feared teams in the East because of their ambidextrous scoring ace, Al Pajonas, Northeastern was highly favored, but hard luck hit them when Pajonas contracted an infected ankle and was unable to play. Demoralized by his absence, the Maroon was hopelessly outclassed, 40-17, as Colby regained its stride.

The second win over Bates followed to the tune of 48 to 38 and the Mules then journeyed to New Hampshire, defeating the Wildcats in another high-scoring spree, 58-43. Winding up the season, Colby cinched a tie with the University of Maine for the state championship with a 58-41 victory over Bowdoin. Lomac set a new scoring record for state series play when he rang up twenty-four points.

Scoring honors for the season went to Zecker and Lomac, the latter's 143 points topping the former's 122 for a game average of better than ten points. The team's accumulation of 621 points or an average game-score of slightly over 44 points as against approximately 39 for their opponents, is indicative of their defensive ability as well as their offensive punch. Sophomores Strup, Puiia, Calahan, Jennings, Zecker, Jaworski, Caminiti; juniors Wescott, Lomac, Ferris; and seniors Flynn, Shiro, LaGassey, and Came, made up one of the best-balanced and most resourceful aggregations to represent Colby in the history of basketball here, and brought a ranking of sixth in New England on the strength of a season's record of eleven victories in fourteen games.


Left to right: Coach Perkins, Emory, Brown, E. Wood, Hilton, Quincy, Hamilt (Manager).

The best material in several seasons reported for cross-country this year. While not winning a single meet, the individual runners showed flashes of form and good promise that the team would get in the win column next year.

Bowdoin won the first meet 42-19 with Quincy finishing third. At New Hampshire the team got the short end of a 43-19 score, hut Frank Quincy ran an outstanding race, leading the field by 20 or 30 yards near the end, and losing a first place only by taking a wrong turn. At the State Intercollegiate Meet in Augusta, Colby was fourth. Quincy in 7th place was again the first Colby man in. At the Bates meet he continued his great running by taking first place with the fastest time turned in over the Lewiston course this season. It was Quincy's first win in two years of competition. In spite of his fine effort, Bates took the meet 33-22.

The N. E. Intercollegiate Meet took place in Boston with Quincy, first man in for Colby, finishing 21st in a field of 96. In the freshman race, Ronald Veysey and Dana Robinson finished 1st and 2nd to raise hopes that next year's cross-country squad would have more to offer. Senior Walt Emery will not be returning, but Quincy, Brown, Graham, Hilton, Wood and Mountfort are expected back and are sure to show improvement.

Colby's 1942 Indoor Track season was consistent with past performances, with the team unable to win over any of its scheduled opponents, but with a few individual performers showing up well in their own events. As usual, Coach Perkins was handicapped in that he had to work with a squad that was comparatively much smaller than opposition squads, and therefore weaker in prospective material.

At the B.A.A. games, Colby entered only its relay team and dash-man, Jim Bateman. Bates won the first scheduled meet 73-43, with Bateman high scorer as he won the broad jump and "300," and placed second in the "600" and the 40. Quincy won the two mile.

Maine beat Colby 98-28, bringing to Waterville a squad so large that each man was entered in but one event. Pratt got the lone win for Colby in the high hurdles. Captain Vic Lebednik got three seconds; and Bateman, Quincy, Goodrich, Turner and Pratt gained points by placing in their events.

IC-1A champion Morcum of New Hampshire furnished pole vault and high jump thrills, as Colby lost its last meet 59½-46½. Lebednik and Quincy established meet records, and Bateman was high scorer for Colby with 13 points. Colby's nine-man squad might well have taken this meet had not Russ Brown and Doug McLeod been sick, taking needed strength from the team.

Once more a strong frosh team gives hope of improvement next year.

The Spring of 1941 found Colby with a very promising outlook for a successful baseball season. However, these optimistic views were not destined to be fulfilled.

Starting off the season, Colby was beaten two in a row by Bowdoin and Maine, but managed to start rolling after that by taking three of their next five games, beating Northeastern twice, and Bates once.

The Bowdoin club were our toughest hurdle as we defeated them but once, while losing three times. To Bates we lost two decisions, after winning the first game 10-9. By taking the last two of a four-game series with the U. of M., we somewhat attended for our earlier defeats by that club, and beat them out for third place in the State Series.

Two strong teams from the University of New Hampshire and the University of Vermont also took a game a piece from Colby, while the Middlebury game was rained out.

Joe Slattery and Gil Peters led the club in hitting: Joe ended up with a .350 average, and Gil just below .300.

The pitching department was not quite as successful as it was the previous season, with Hegan falling off somewhat, leaving Slattery to assume a greater pitching burden. The infield consisting of Capt. Peters, Bobby LaFleur, "Tee" Laliberte, Jenny Lee, and Frankie Downie behind the plate, was properly balanced by a capable-outfield made up of Eddie Loring, Milt Stillwell, and Bob Dennison, with Joe Slattery playing right field when not hurling.



The tennis team, made up of four inexperienced men and two veterans, had a very successful season. Beaten by Bowdoin, Vermont, and Middlebury, the season was capped by a fine showing in the State Tournament. Captain Dyer and Captain-Elect Lord, after being beaten twice in the dual matches won the State Doubles Championship. Lord, after defeating Stern of Bowdoin in the semi-finals, lost his match to Ireland in the finals of the State Tournament. Ed Alexander, Carl Pizzano, George Burnett, and Dwight Howard in their first year of competition, did very well.

A trip to Vermont was the highlight of the season. We met the University of Vermont, Middlebury, and Norwich University in this series. Vermont and Middlebury eked out 54 victories, while Norwich was beaten 8-1.

In the Maine-State Dual matches, Colby was paced by Captain Dyer, who won all but his matches with Bowdoin. At the number one position, Lord also won all his matches, except a 3-set match against Ireland. Carl Pizzano, after losing all his matches, made his season successful by being the lone winner against Bowdoin.

Colby's freshman football team got off to a poor start when they were defeated by an inferior Kent's Hill eleven, 6.0 on a mud-soaked gridiron on October 10th. The freshmen had the necessary power to score, but fumbles proved costly. With only seconds left to play, an intercepted pass deep in Colby's territory, set up the margin of victory for Kent's Hill. In winning, Kent's Hill made only one first down to the freshmen's six.

A week later, the freshmen eleven came back to defeat a powerful Coburn Classical Institute team, 6-0. The "Mulettes" were slow in starting, but finally produced the needed power to win. It was the first defeat in over a year for Coburn Classical.

On the 24th of October, a powerful Hebron Academy team came to Waterville. Hebron had previously defeated the University of Maine freshmen football team, and were counting on a victory over Colby. After an evenly fought first-half, the Academy team went out to win by the score of 14-7.

The "up and down" freshmen came back a week later to down a big Ricker Classical eleven, 6.0. This brought the season standing to two wins and two losses.

Despite their mediocre season, the freshmen proved an immense help in aiding the varsity to win the Maine State Championship, by working opponents' plays against them after their season was officially over.

Colby's Freshman cagers did not match the undefeated record of last year's team, but they did put together an imposing list of ten victories as against three losses.


Opening the season against Waterville High, a 32-14 win looked impressive for the yearlings, but they just managed to edge Coburn 27-24 after the holidays. Taking to the road, Colby downed Higgins 47-40 on their court, and upset Kent's Hill 62-38.

The "Forty-fivers" entertained Bridgton for a 49-26 victory, and their fifth straight win. At this point Boynton left school after sparking the Frosh attack in the opening games. As a result, Kent's Hill edged out a 33-32 win for the Frosh's first defeat which was quickly followed by their second when Winslow came out on top. 28-26. Undaunted, the Freshmen sank Thornton 34-27, knocked off Hebron 37-32, took Higgins again 39-35, and shaded Coburn 43-42

Ricker was tossed for a 34-24 count in the last regular game, but in an added contest against Governor Dummer Prep School, the Frosh were administered their third loss of the season.

Colby's Freshman Indoor Track saw almost regular ups and downs for the team. Their first encounter of the year resulted in a win as they beat Bridgeton Academy 36½-34½. Weinstein smashed the freshman and meet records for the "600" and Robinson and Lewis won the mile and high jump, respectively.

Thornton Academy won their meet 48-42, but Weinstein again broke the frosh "600" record. Lewis won the high jump.

The Bates freshman team went down to the count of 59-49 as Robinson and Burke finished 1-2 in the mile and "1000." Lewis took firsts in the high jump and high hurdles, and just missed breaking the meet record. Weinstein, Arra and Barton also garnered points.

In their next to last meet, the frosh took a drubbing at the hands of the Maine yearlings who won 85-31. Six meet records were broken. Barton, Lucy, Robinson, Weinstein, Crowther, and Mahoney made points. Lewis won the low and high hurdles, and his win in the high jump was a meet and frosh cage record. A team crippled by sickness was beaten 58-31 by New Hampshire.

A quadrangle meet with Cony High School, Coburn Classical Institute, Maine Central Institute, and Colby participating, was held too late in the season for publication in the 1942 Oracle.

Next year's varsity will be greatly strengthened by the addition of these freshmen who have done more than their share of record breaking.
