THE NEW CATALOGUE.

Edition for the College Year of 1907-1908 is Ready for Distribution.

The eighty-eighth annual catalogue of Colby College, for 1907-1908, has just been issued. In general appearance it closely resembles its immediate predecessor, except that it has grown somewhat in size and contains three pages more than last year's catalogue, making a total of one hundred and five pages. The list of members of the Faculty contains two new names, Ellis Earle Lawton, Ph. D., Associate Professor of Physics and Astronomy, and Charles Emerson Fogg, A. B., instructor in gymnastics.

The summary shows a Faculty of seventeen, and a total of 239 students, an increase of two over last year. The students are distributed among the different classes as follows:

A detailed outline of the courses for the A. B. and B. S. degrees for the whole period of four years, required and elective subjects, is given on pages 68-73 of the new catalogue; a complete synopsis of the admission requirements for both courses on page 42.

Among the new courses offered will be noted several as follows: An advanced course in Debating, English Literature, History of Art, Education, Drawing, freehand and mechanical, Biblical Literature, Physiology and Hygiene (for members of the Women's Division), and a number of new courses in Physics.

The most marked advance in the curriculum has been made in the department of Physics, the purpose being to prepare students in advanced work leading directly to the technical courses in Mechanical, Civil, Electrical, Sanitary, and Mining Engineering, and in Architecture and Medicine; thus making it possible for students to enter the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, or some other technical school of the same high grade, with advanced standing of at least the Junior year, and complete a professional course in two years or less. This arrangement which goes into effect with the year 1908-1909 combines the benefits of the best education at the classical college and the professional training of the best technical school.

The Library now contains 44,867 volumes and 20,000 pamphlets.

The new members of the Board of Trustees are Charlie A. Jones, Esq., Woburn, Mass.; Rev. J. K. Wilson, D. D., Portland; Frank H. Edmunds, Esq., New York; Rev. Woodman Bradbury, D. D., Cambridge; and Hon. Beecher Putnam, Houlton. The last three are Alumni Trustees.

A distinct innovation in this year's catalogue will be noted in the adoption of the semester or two-term system for the arrangement of the college year in place of the three-term system now in vogue. This new arrangement, adopted by the Faculty and Trustees last January, will go into effect in September. The calendar for both the present and the next academic year is given in detail and the new adjustment of vacations and examination periods, which is quite different from that of the present year, is fully explained.

The catalogue contains the usual register of officers, committees, students, and honors, the descriptions and synopsis of courses, an account of the equipment and administration of the college, forms of bequest, and general

The catalogue is attractively bound in a rich gray cover, neatly printed in dark blue, and altogether is an excellent specimen of the printer's art and exhibits care and painstaking work in its preparation.

WON FROM HEBRON.

The Colby Team Trims the Academy Boys in a Game Played Under Difficulties.

Last Saturday afternoon Colby played Hebron Academy at Hebron but the condition of the field did not permit the best work possible on the part of either team. Until the sixth inning Hebron led by the score of seven to four, but in the last three innings Shaw replaced Applebee in the box for Colby, and the entire team began to bat with more success than earlier in the game. The final score was fourteen to eight in favor of Colby.

Because of the situation of the field the diamond had not dried off to any extent and the outfield was little more than a swamp. In the vicinity of first base the field could not be used at all and so the diamond was swung around in the direction of third base. By this means some of the mud was avoided but the change placed left field in the midst of a grove and the impossibility of catching flies or handling the ball with any degree of speed in this quarter was responsible for the size of the scores.

Applebee pitched for Colby for the first five innings and he did very creditable work in that position. Both sides batted quite heavily, however, and luck in placing the hits among the trees figured in the result. After the fifth inning Shaw went into the box and held his former prep-school team down to one score. Sawyer also pitched good ball for Hebron.

One of the features of the game was the work of Wilson at first base on Hebron. He took everything high and low that came his way and he also batted finely.

Several errors were made by each team but they were due mostly to the condition of the grounds, which rendered clean playing impossible.

The members of the team remained at Hebron over Sunday and left Monday morning for the Massachusetts trip.

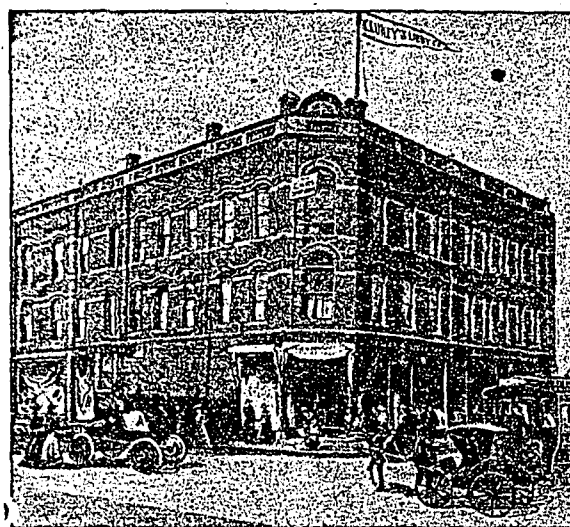

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
