NARDINI SMASHES COLLEGE RECORD IN INTERCLASS MEET.

COBURN SWAMPS M. C. I.

Saturday afternoon a double header track meet was held on Alumni Field. In the Colby Interclass Track Meet, the Junior Class came out on top with forty-two points. The seniors were a close second with thirty-seven points, while the freshmen came in third with twenty-eight points, and the sophomores last with only nineteen points. In the other meet of the afternoon between Coburn Classical Institute and Maine Central Institute, everything was Coburn's. Maine Central was able to secure only one first place.

The event of the afternoon was the hundred yard dash. Nardini repeated the stunt which he had been performing consistently during the week and came down the hundred stretch at a ten second clip.

On the whole the times and distances were slow. The day was bad and it is a little early in the season for record time. Still a careful study of the summary shows that Colby has as good track prospects this spring as she has ever had.

The weather conditions also slowed up the Coburn-M. C. I. Meet. Although Coburn had everything her own way as to results, M. C. I. pushed her runners hard in some of the events. The stars of the afternoon were Murchie of Coburn, who won the hammer throw, discus throw, and broad jump, and took second place in the shot put and high jump; Tarbox of Coburn, who won the 100 and 440; and Carson of M. C. I., who was strong in the distances.

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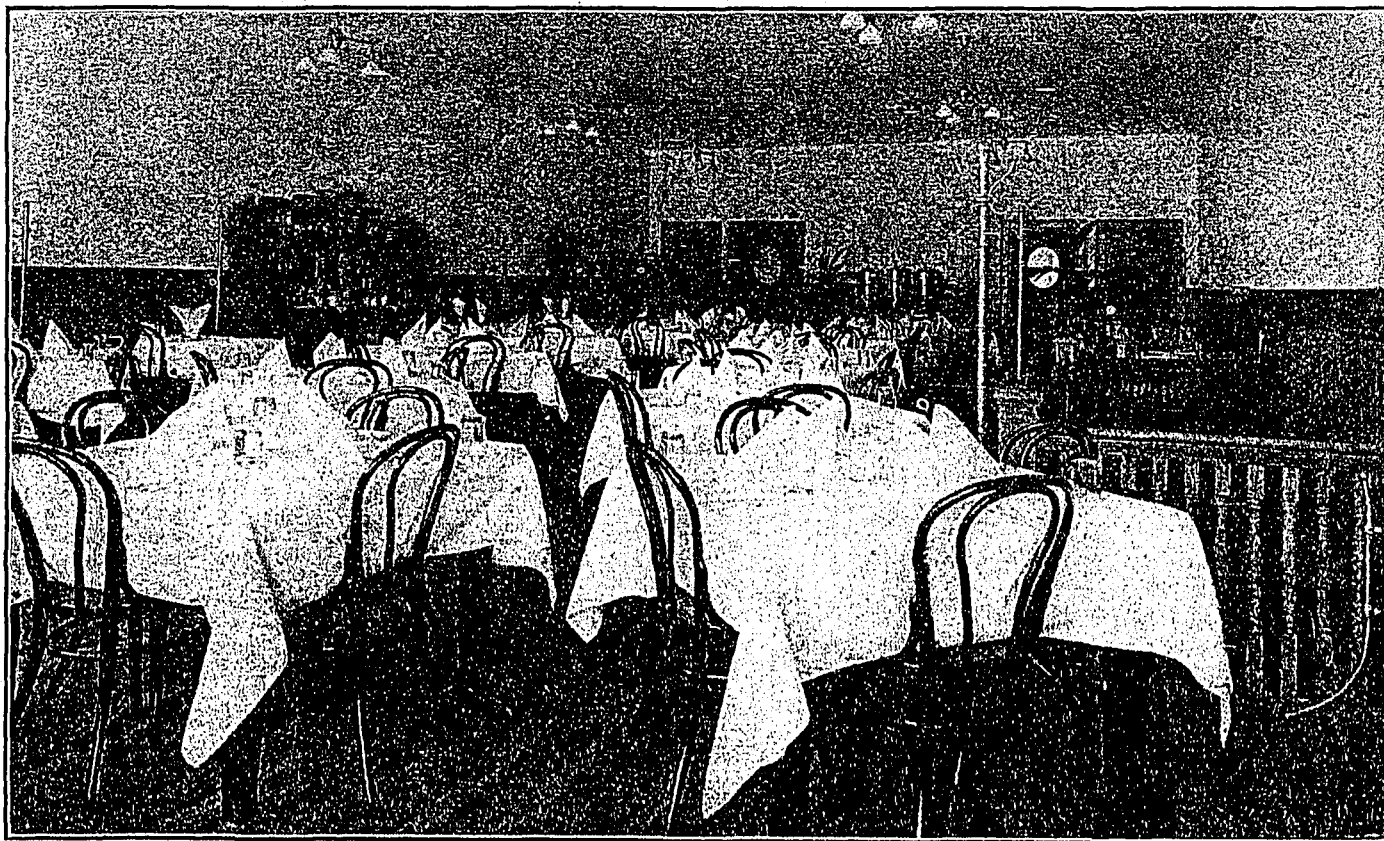
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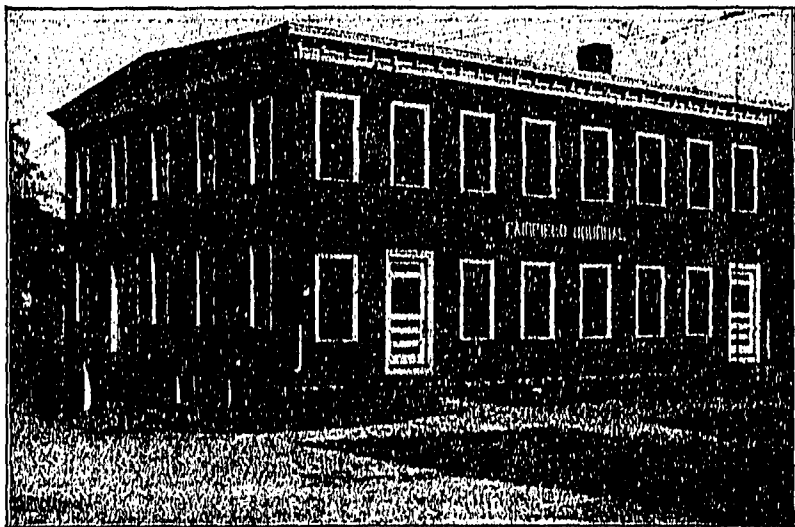
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
