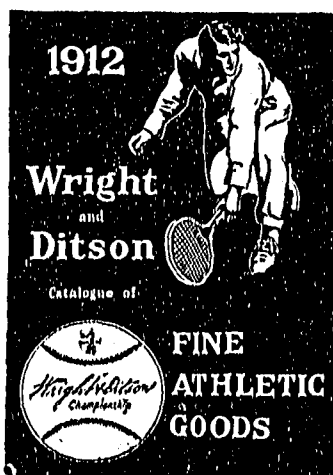

COLBY MEN EQUALS RECORDS IN CHAMPIONSHIP MEET.

Herrick and Nardini were the Colby stars of the eighteenth championship meet of the Maine Intercollegiate Athletic Association at Brunswick last Saturday. Herrick equalled the state record in the high jump by his leap of 5 feet, 8 inches. Nardini was the individual point winner of the meet. He took three first places, winning the hundred yard dash, winning the broad jump and smashing the Colby record in that event with a distance of 21 feet, 3 1-8 inches, and equalling the state record and breaking the Colby record in the 220 yard dash with the time of 22 1-5 seconds.

Rogers of Maine raised the pole vault record to 11 feet, 6 inches. Shepard of Bates sent the shot to 42 feet, 23 1/4 inches, and Gove from the same college, the discus to 125 feet, 6 1/8 inches.

Except for the work of Nardini and Herrick the day went badly for Colby. Bates won the championship with a score of 43 points, Maine second with 39, Colby third with 26 points, and Bowdoin fourth with 18 points. Until the quarter mile Colby prospects were bright, but when Bowen

was shoved off the track in that event and failed to place, the tide turned against us. In the half mile the failure of Cates, who had generally been conceded first place, to land better than third dashed all hopes of a championship.

Farnsworth and Royal showed up well in the hurdles, winning easy third places and pushing the leaders hard for second. In the weights Colby was weak. Tibbetts was the only man to qualify, and he failed to place in the final reckoning. Good and Lord both qualified in the dashes, but were distanced in the finals.

MAINE CENTRAL VS. COLBY.

The game of Wednesday afternoon was rather slow and uninteresting. Colby played well the first four innings preventing any score and getting one herself, but the superior batting of the Portland team in the last part of the game brought an easy victory for the visitors by a score of 6 to 1.

EDWARD J. DALY.

Edward J. Daly has been engaged as physical director at Colby for next year. He will coach football and baseball and will have charge of the gymnasium. Mr. Daly is a Dartmouth athlete. At that college he played four years on both baseball and football teams and was the only man ever captain of both.

ATHLETIC COUNCIL.

At the meeting of the athletic council Monday night the report of the delegates to the M. I. A. B. was received and accepted. The football schedule for 1913 was approved, subject to approval of the faculty. Mr. Adams was re-elected track coach for next year.

M. I. A. B.

The spring meeting of the Maine Inter-collegiate Arbitration Board was held at the Boston City Club May 10. The usual routine business was transacted. Bates protested the game with Maine at Orono, May 8, but the protest was later with-

drawn. It was decided that the mere signing of a contract to play major league ball did not render such player ineligible for the state series. It was also voted to submit an amendment to the various athletic associations, which amendment will be submitted later.

ADDRESS BY HON. W. R. PATTANGALL.

Hon. W. R. Pattangall addressed an audience of college men in the chapel, Tuesday evening, the meeting being under the auspices of the Wilson Club. Mr. Pattangall confined his remarks to a discussion of state issues, dwelling largely on the policies and conduct of the present state administration.

FORMATIVE PERIOD IN COLBY HISTORY.

Charles P. Chipman, librarian of the college, has compiled a brief history of the Formative Period in Colby History. This was published in instalments in the Colby Alumnus. The whole work has now been issued in attractive pamphlet form. It is a brief and interesting survey of the events which led to the founding of Colby and the first few years of her existence.

F. B. McLeary left this noon for Cambridge where he will spend the remainder of the week. He will attend the Harvard-Yale Track Meet, and be present at the reunion of the Holworthy men. May 18 is the hundredth anniversary of the building of Holworthy Hall, one of the old senior dormitories.

The attention of the ECHO has been called to the fact that Walter Emerson of the class of 1884 ran the 100 yard dash in ten seconds. This record was made before the time was kept in any closer divisions than one half seconds. It is now the only one of the old field day records which has not been bettered.

The work of Coach Adams this year with the track team speaks for itself. In the little-over-a-year that he has had charge of the team, college records have been made in all save three events—the hammer, shot, and two mile. From a freshman class with no experienced track men, he developed a team which took nearly half of the points won by Colby in her dual meet. Under his care the veterans have been trained to do better work than ever before. That the team did not win the championship is a disappointment, but that it was the best team Colby ever had is generally conceded and also that the excellence of the team is due for the most part to the hard work and skill of the coach.

Last week the college had as its guests preparatory school students who had taken part in the prize speaking contests conducted by the college. The interest in this department of educational work throughout the college and state have been greatly stimulated by the prizes which have been offered through the generosity of Colby alumni. Public speaking is an

art which gives power to anyone. That a man can stand on his feet and say what he thinks clearly and convincingly can never be a detriment to him. On the other hand how often men who could not do so have been held back from success by their inability to talk!

Herrick and Nardini have been the backbone of the track team this year. Herrick won eight points for Colby in the intercollegiate meet and equalled the high jump record. The work of Nardini has been more phenomenal. The week before in the dual meet, he ran the hundred in 10 seconds—a feat in itself sufficient to mark him as an exceptional athlete. Add to that his work in equalling the state record in the 220 yard dash and breaking the college record in the broad jump, and you have a fair estimate of the ability of the man who has made track a major sport at Colby.

FINALS IN THE GOODWIN INTER-SCHOLASTIC DEBATING LEAGUE

The final debate in the Goodwin Interscholastic Debating League was held Thursday evening at the Waterville Opera House. Maine Central Institute and Waterville High School were the teams to face each other in the last and decisive contest.

M. C. I. came down from Pittsfield one hundred fifty strong, headed by their band.

The principals, coaches and members of the several debating teams were the guests of the College at a banquet at the Royal. Mr. Libby welcomed the guests in a brief speech.

The debate was spirited and hard fought. At the rise of the curtain loud and continued applause greeted the contesting teams. Cheers by each school were given for the men who were to represent them in the debate.

The men as they spoke in order in debate and rebuttal were closely followed in their remarks by the audience, who appreciatively applauded their points as made and scored upon opponents. It was a good, clean, well-contested debate.

At the close of the debate the judges retired to consult concerning the decision. During this period both schools gave their class yells and songs and much spirit was manifest. Upon the appearance of Mr. Perkins, Chairman of the Board of Judges, every one became silent as he came to the center of the stage.

In giving the decision he said: "In a closely contested debate such as this has been, there is the greatest of honor in victory and in defeat only glory." Then he awarded the victory to M. C. I., the winning team in this the final debate.

LYFORD SPEAKING CONTEST.

The third annual Lyford Interscholastic Prize Speaking Contest was held in Memorial Hall Friday afternoon and evening, May 10th. To this contest came forty-four

orators, representing twenty-six schools. The visitors were entertained by the Colby student body. The fraternity houses with their full privileges and genuine hospitality were thrown open to them. The results and the rivalry indicate that this contest was the closest and best yet held. After supper a short concert was held on the campus for the benefit of the speakers. The concert proved to be a most enjoyable feature of the day's program. The band played, the students cheered, and the quartet sang. The judges of the contest also were called upon to speak a few words. In a few pithy remarks, Mr. W. C. Crawford, '82, praised the work of the young orators and expressed his satisfaction of the important place that public speaking is now holding in our colleges and high schools. At the close of the contest, the judges announced their decision. They said that after careful consideration and serious thought, they decided that the fortunate ones were:

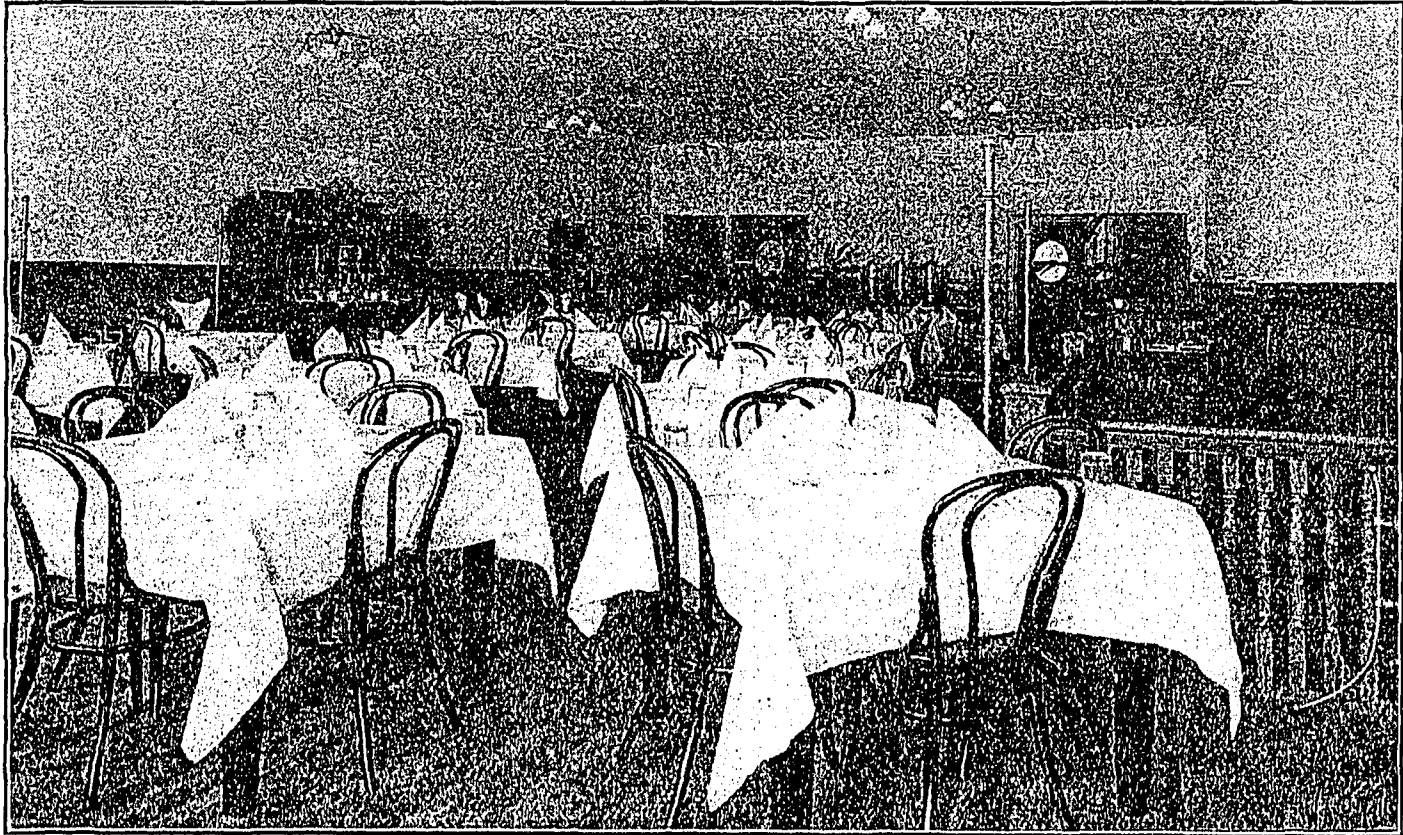

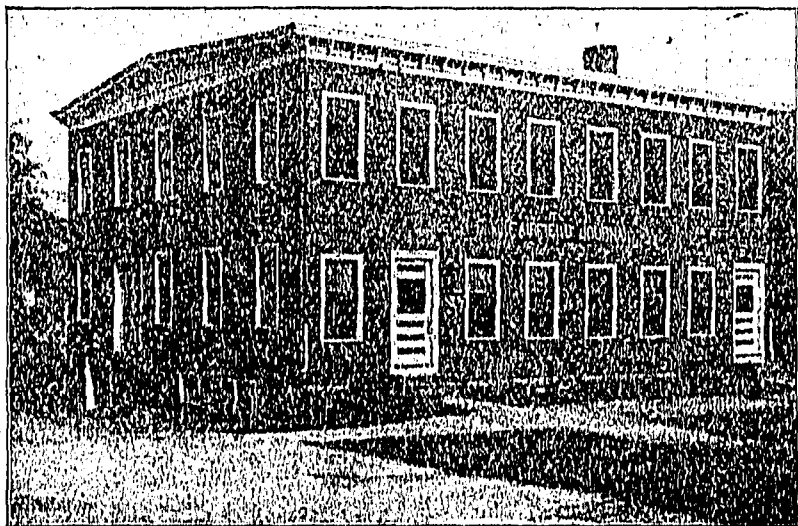
