#### COLBY VS. HOLY CROSS.

In the dual track meet with Holy Cross, last Saturday, Colby lost by a score of 74 to 52. The meet took place under decidedly unfavorable conditions, distinctly un-May-like weather and a cold wind hampering the participants, and making spectators miserable. No fast times were made, and but little idea of track prospects for this spring could be gained.

For Colby, Meanix was the individual star, winning sixteen points by taking three firsts and a third. Murchie, in taking first place in the hammer throw, broke the college record established by Coombs in 1906.

Captain Nardini, the old reliable, was also on hand. He participated in but two events, taking eight points. This is but half as many as he has taken in previous meets, but "Dini" has only recently returned to college, after being out with eye trouble, and he is training himself for next Saturday's work. The other men showed up well in their various events, and although nothing sensational was done, several new men look promising.

#### THE BATES GAME, 4-1.

Through a grand rally in the last inning, Colby defeated Bates at Lewiston, last Wednesday afternoon. Up to the ninth inning the game was one to one, Bates having scored in the third and Colby in the fifth innings. The entire game was a battle between the two batteries, with the odds slightly in favor of Colby, for Griffin, the star Bates catcher, broke his leg in an attempt to slide home in the second inning, colliding with Lowney, who was blocking him on the base line. In the ninth, however, things began to break right for Colby, Dacey coming to the bat and starting the ball rolling with a twobagger. Anderson, the Bates pitcher, then lost control and Colby managed to score two more runs. The Bates team tried hard to duplicate the feat when they went to their last bat but it was a hopeless task, the first man up getting as far as first on a passed ball, and the next three striking and flying out.

The splendid come-back shown by our team was most gratifying, as it again places us in the championship ring with strong chances of taking the first place this year.

#### TENNIS TOURNAMENT.

As a result of the tournament held on the college campus last week, Capt. Harold C. Morse, '14, Henry S. Cushman, '13, John H. Foster, '13, and Frank T. Gillingham, '14, were chosen to represent the college at the Maine Intercollegiate Tennis Tournament, held at Bates college, this week.

In the first round of the doubles, Morse and Cushman defeated Bird and Towle, of Maine, 6-2, 7-5; Foster and Gillingham lost to Woodman and Tomblen, of Bates, 6-2, 6-3. In the semi-finals,

Morse and Cushman won from Savage and Slocum, of Bowdoin, 7-5, 5-7, 6-4. The finals in the doubles are to be played Wednesday.

In the first round of the singles, which were played on Tuesday, Morse lost to Nickerson, of Bates, 6-4, 3-6, 7-5; and Foster won from Bird, of Maine, 6-2, 6-2. In the second round, Foster defeated Nickerson, of Bates, 6-4, 6-3. The finals are also to be played on Wednesday.

## HEBRON WINS JUNIOR LEAGUE PENNANT.

By defeating Higgins Classical Institute, 8 to 5, Saturday morning, Hebron Academy won the Junior League baseball pennant. Weather conditions, during the whole series, were far from comfortable for the players and their supporters, a cold wind blowing from the northwest nearly all the time.

The first game of the series was played Friday afternoon, between Hebron and Coburn, resulting in a 6 to 0 victory for Hebron. Williams was the mainstay of the Coburn team, striking out twelve Hebron batsmen. The support given him, however, was poor. McDonald, the Hebron pitcher, allowed but three hits, and was backed up by a team which played almost errorless ball.

Higgins and Ricker then crossed bats in a rather one-sided game which resulted in an easy victory for Higgins, 10 to 1. The features of the game were the pitching of Albert, who allowed the Ricker boys only four hits and struck out twenty-one men, the batting of Shaw, Albert and Noyes, and the one-handed catch of Guiou in the fifth inning. The fielding of both teams was rather ragged at times.

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
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
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
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
