COLBY VS. HOLY CROSS.

In the dual track meet with Holy Cross, last Saturday, Colby lost by a score of 74 to 52. The meet took place under decidedly unfavorable conditions, distinctly un-May-like weather and a cold wind hampering the participants, and making spectators miserable. No fast times were made, and but little idea of track prospects for this spring could be gained.

For Colby, Meanix was the individual star, winning sixteen points by taking three firsts and a third. Murchie, in taking first place in the hammer throw, broke the college record established by Coombs in 1906.

Captain Nardini, the old reliable, was also on hand. He participated in but two events, taking eight points. This is but half as many as he has taken in previous meets, but "Dini" has only recently returned to college, after being out with eye trouble, and he is training himself for next Saturday's work. The other men showed up well in their various events, and although nothing sensational was done, several new men look promising.

THE BATES GAME, 4-1.

Through a grand rally in the last inning, Colby defeated Bates at Lewiston, last Wednesday afternoon. Up to the ninth inning the game was one to one, Bates having scored in the third and Colby in the fifth innings. The entire game was a battle between the two batteries, with the odds slightly in favor of Colby, for Griffin, the star Bates catcher, broke his leg in an attempt to slide home in the second inning, colliding with Lowney, who was blocking him on the base line. In the ninth, however, things began to break right for Colby, Dacey coming to the bat and starting the ball rolling with a two-bagger. Anderson, the Bates pitcher, then lost control and Colby managed to score two more runs. The Bates team tried hard to duplicate the feat when they went to their last bat but it was a hopeless task, the first man up getting as far as first on a passed ball, and the next three striking and flying out.

The splendid come-back shown by our team was most gratifying, as it again places us in the championship ring with strong chances of taking the first place this year.

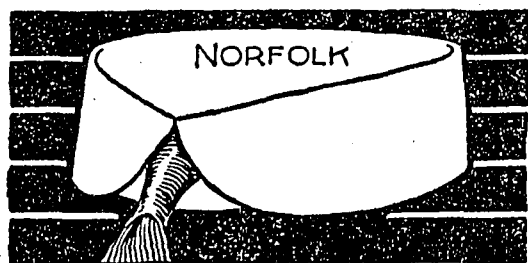

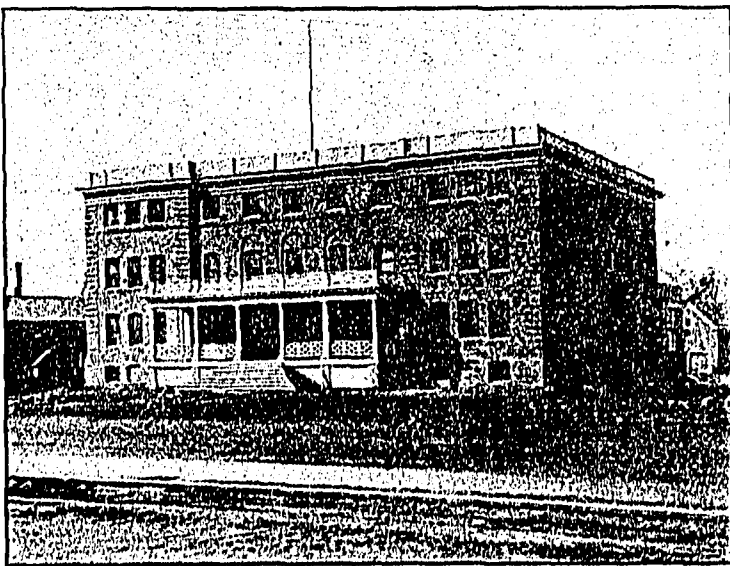
