The front cover illustration is Jack B. Yeats's "His Thoughts Far Away," 1955, given to the College by Mrs. Mary Bunting Smith and now hanging in the Healy Room foyer. The reproduction suffers by the loss of Yeats's vivid colors, but we wanted to share an image of our good fortune with CQ readers. A full account of the painting is in *CLQ*, XXV, 4 (December 1989). The back cover illustration, an original sketch of J. M. Synge by John Butler Yeats, is also on display in the Healy Room.
