



## THE COURSE OF INSTRUCTION

substantially identical with the Regular Classical Course in the larger Colleges of New England. There are Special Courses open to those prepared to take them. Additional facilities for laboratory work are now furnished.

## APPARATUS AND CABINET.

The departments of Physics and Chemistry are well equipped with apparatus for experiments. For the study of Natural Science there are collections illustrative of Ornithology, Conchology, Geology, and Mineralogy. The Observatory is furnished with a telescope and other instruments for instruction in Astronomy.

## PHYSICAL TRAINING.

The general principles of Physical Education are taught in the first year, followed by the study of Physiology illustrated by the skeleton and other preparations, and by an elegant series of colored charts. A large gymnasium is provided with facilities for in-door exercise.

## LIBRARY AND READING-ROOM.

The University Library of 19,500 bound volumes is a choice collection well arranged in a building which is a model of its kind. The alcoves are open to the students, and the contents of the shelves are rendered easy of access by means of a card catalogue and indexes. The Reading-Room contains the best periodicals, and is always open.

## EXPENSES.

The Trustees are determined to furnish the best possible education at the lowest practicable cost. Tuition is \$45 per annum. The total necessary expenses of each year, including board, washing, fuel, and lights, are from \$225 to \$275.

## PRIZES AND SCHOLARSHIPS.

There are several prizes offered for excellence in Reading, Declamation, and Composition. The Merrill prizes for exceptionally good preparation for college, and for excellence in scholarship, amount to \$100 per annum. For indigent students, allowances varying from \$30 to \$60 are made, on certain conditions, from the income of scholarship funds amounting to \$76,000.
