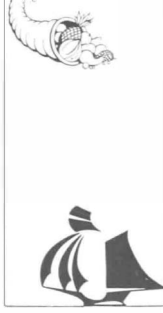

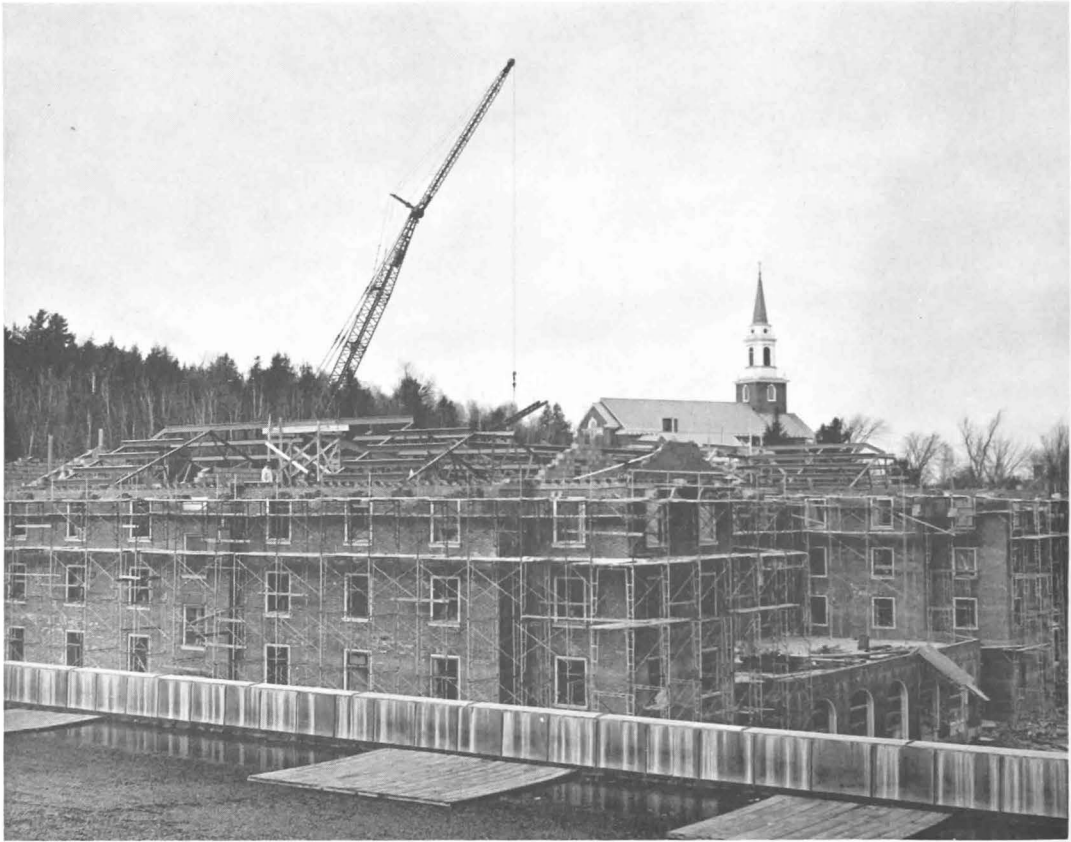

THE ALUMNUS will try to fulfill this request in future issues; currently there are a number of faculty members and students writing possible articles.

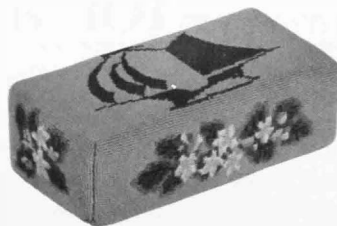

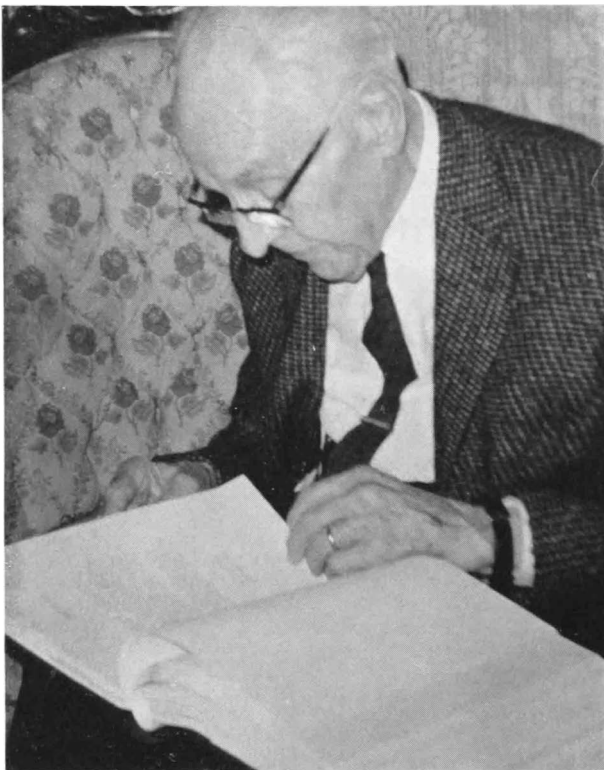

A Man for all Seasons

HONORS

HERBERT CARLYLE LIBBY, '02

Here he is, always a strong figure, always in a leadership position, a center of controversy frequently, always articulate, eloquent, and clear, always with a deep loyalty to the college he loved. Surely, we can say, without fear of contradiction, a man for all seasons.

WITH THESE WORDS, LEONARD MAYO '22 concluded his tribute to a great teacher on Colby Night in October. Although Herbert Carlyle Libby was unable to attend the festivities in his honor, he did hear the proceedings on a taped recording. Mr. Mayo's words must have gladdened him.

"I remember vividly the day I walked into Chemical Hall as a green and lonely freshman, knowing no one at the college . . . a very attractive, fine-looking man with a warm handshake came to greet me and somehow I received the idea that the college had not quite been able to function until I arrived. . . ."

In reviewing Dr. Libby's long college and community career, Mr. Mayo made note of his service as mayor, first director of the chamber of commerce, superintendent of Waterville schools, and founder of Colby's first lecture-ship series. He quoted Dean Marriner's words on Dr. Libby's unsuccessful bid for the candidacy for governor of Maine, that the Republican inner circle did not want him: "no one wanted him . . . except the people." And speaking of his "sense of history", Mr. Mayo commented on the meaningfully chronicled events recorded in THE ALUMNUS under Dr. Libby's outstanding seventeen-year tenure as editor.

"I learned a variety of things from this teacher," Mr. Mayo said, "from how to order a meal in a hotel to how to meet the President in the White House . . . how to lose a debate gracefully." Few professors have had such a wit, and such a demanding method of instruction: it was Dr. Libby's custom in his public speaking classes to drop books, rattle windows, stand in front of the student and peer up at him — to attempt any diversion to shake the speaker's confidence and delivery. Prophesying that the next history of the college would have a chapter entitled *Herbert Carlyle Libby — A Man for All Seasons*, Mr. Mayo spoke of Dr. Libby's influence on the relocation of Colby: "Our presence here to-

night on Mayflower Hill is due to Herbert Libby as much as to any other one man."

Elizabeth Sweetser Baxter '41 presented gifts to Dr. Libby, including an antique clock; Colby Wedgwood cups and plates; a Colby chair engilded with the signatures of many, many former students as well as colleagues and friends; and a voluminous book of letters of tribute to the beloved teacher.

She also announced the establishment of the Herbert Carlyle Libby Prize in Public Address "to give recognition to outstanding ability in public speaking." This prize will be given to the best speaker in the college, following a competition between four finalists — one from each class. President Strider accepted the prize with thanks and commended the alumni and alumnae on their fine choice of this tangible tribute to Dr. Libby.

Herbert Carlyle Libby's deep involvement with the college he loved ("In the life of every man or woman who makes a contribution there is one organization to which he or she is most dedicated," Mr. Mayo said) is reflected in his words prepared for the occasion, and read by his son, Willard D. Libby '37.

Dr. Libby's Address

I HAVE EXPRESSED TO THE ALUMNI SECRETARY and the committee on Colby Night my deepest regrets on my absence from this occasion tonight. But I would like to assure you who have gathered here that nothing in the wide world would have kept me from attendance but physical ailments which plague people of my age. And I add a similar regret from Mrs. Libby.

In the tribute given me on the printed program for the sixtieth Colby Night Dinner, generous mention is made of my service to the college and my influence upon students in my classes. May I tell you frankly that I received

from the college and the students far more than I ever gave. Above and beyond all else is the lesson I learned from one of the greatest teachers and presidents with whom I was closely associated for many years, Arthur Jeremiah Roberts. I learned from him that a student is something more than a name. He knew every student intimately, knew his father and mother; and when he entered his classes he faced individuals, not a class. So well did he know them that in his teaching he knew when to push them forward to leadership or to walk by their side as companion. This personal relationship developed influence and trust and desire and respect for knowledge. So impressive was this gift from the college, that during thirty five consecutive years of teaching I did my level best to follow this alluring relationship of student and teacher, and teaching took on new meaning.

Knowing all you can about a student opens ways of approach to confidence and it challenges the teacher to do vastly more than the rules require. It has led to an enduring friendship with a great number of my four thousand students. Scores of letters are exchanged each year. They write me of their problems, their achievements, and of the old college days, and the marked contrast of today and yesterday in the vast field of education. There are but few of them who do not express concern over finding the ways and means of educating their own children or helping their grandchildren. And I am highly privileged to reply by giving them the latest news of their rapidly growing college, assuring them that Colby is in safe hands, that the ideals of the founders are still pursued, and that new ideals, made necessary by the newer days, have been added. It is a matter of addition and not subtraction.

And, happily, I can tell you that the house at 73 Pleasant Street, for many years a gathering place for students and overflow classes, is still open to them as it was fifty five years ago when my first classes were held. And I am equally happy to tell them that Mrs. Libby and I are there to give them hearty welcome.

My hope tonight is that the Colby of today, with all of its splendid ideals, may be the Colby of tomorrow and that no one of us will do aught to have it otherwise.

With most sincere appreciation of the honor which this occasion brings me, and equally sincere regrets for my absence, I wish you all good health and happiness.

Chansonetta Stanley Emmons

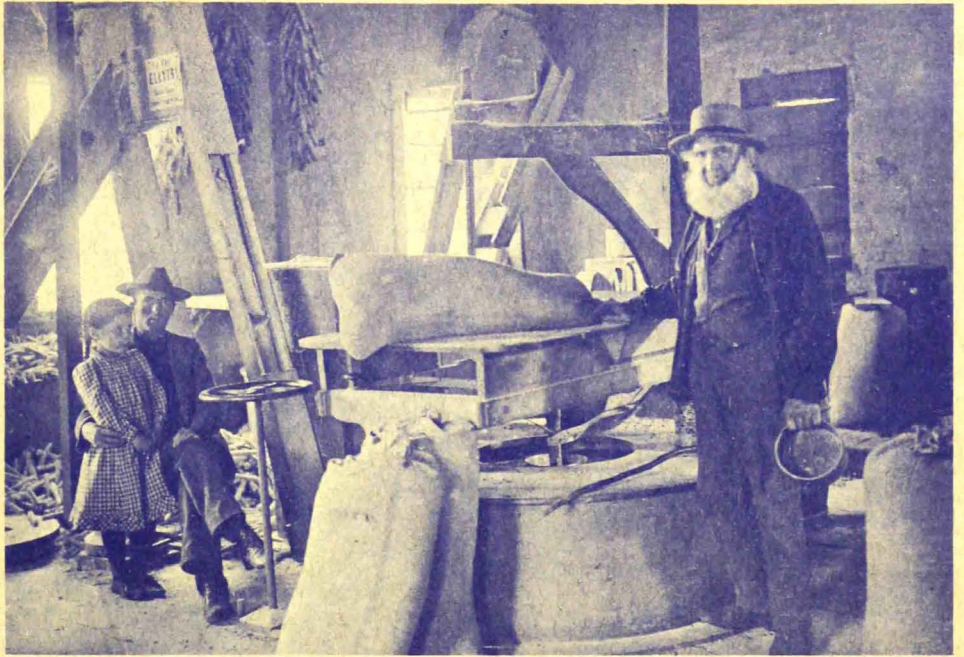
The fact that an independent citizenry in rural, nineteenth-century Maine would honor that double anomaly—a female photographer—is eloquent testimony to the obvious dedication Chansonetta Stanley Emmons had to her craft. With artistry and technical savoir-faire, she recorded “not only a . . . set of strong, distinctive faces; she also preserved on glass plates . . . a now-forgotten way of life.” (AMERICAN HERITAGE, February 1962.)

These photographs are not merely representations of life two generations ago. The sense of documentation is particular: they *are* that life. Imbued with the feeling of living presence, their powerful ease leads the viewer into an expectation that the subjects are about to move.

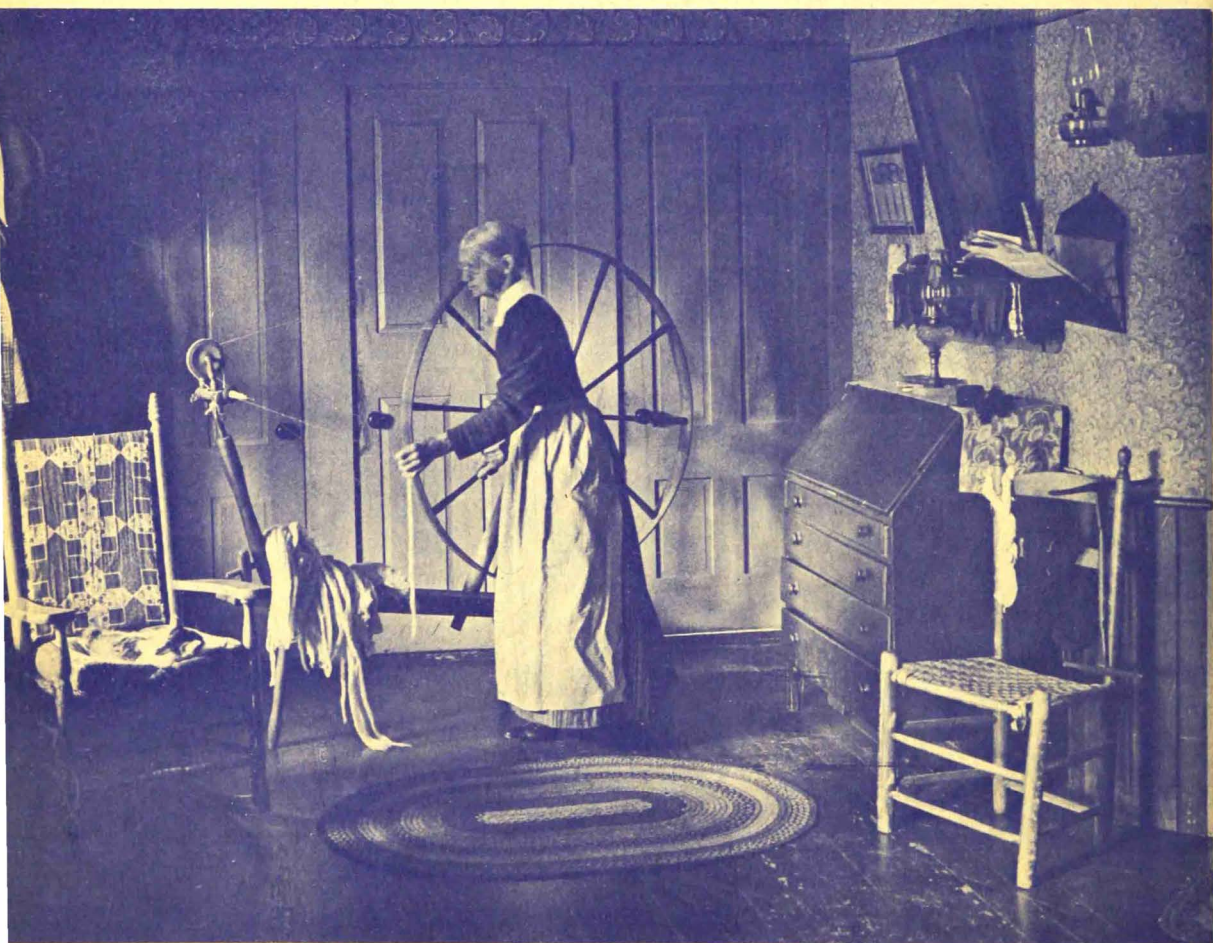
Mrs. Emmons carried her large, unwieldy box camera into parlors, kitchens, attics, barns, mills, blacksmith shops, and into fields and along streams near her native town of Kingfield. She had been freed from the confines of a studio, and the resulting aesthetic limitations, by her brothers (eventually the builders of the wonderful Stanley Steamer) who had developed a dry-plate process for their talented sister. She could then, in her concentration upon composition and subject, use all the possibilities—indoors and out—of natural light.

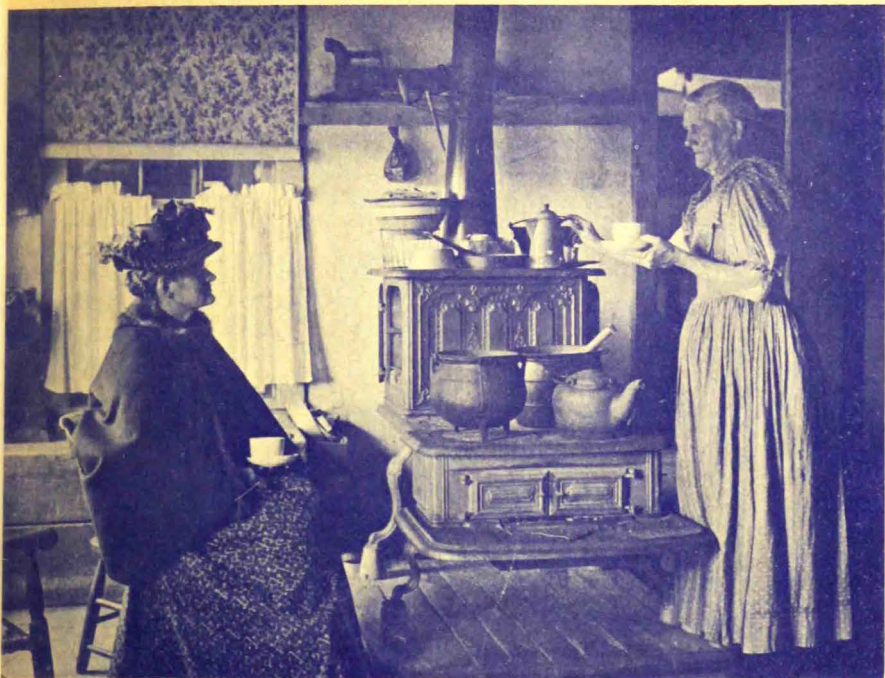
A collection of some forty-five of Mrs. Emmons' photographs were given to the college by her son-in-law, Irl G. Whitchurch of Denver, Colorado. They have been exhibited both at the Colby museum and at the Farnsworth Museum in Rockland. Their pleasure has been twofold: the photographs delight the eye of the artist, and re-create for old and young a quite vanished world.

THE President's Page

A LIBERAL ARTS COLLEGE MUST concern itself with all of human learning, but it must do so in a selective way. Since both time and facilities are limited in all human enterprises, we try to make the best use of both in the measure that is available to us. Each major area of knowledge is represented in one way or another, and we constantly try to improve what we are doing — sometimes by broadening the range, sometimes by intensifying what we have.

We have achieved a good deal of success in the arts. I would like to tell you a little of what Colby has been able to do. It should be remembered that, before Dr. Bixler came, Colby had neither art nor music departments. It is to his everlasting credit that he established them. Both are now not only thriving but their existence is taken for granted and their enrollments are steadily growing. In twenty years we have come a very long way.

The art department began just as one person, and has grown to include three full-time faculty members and a curator for the Colby College Art Museum. The permanent collection has grown in a spectacular fashion. Few colleges of our size can point to such riches among their permanent acquisitions. The collection is a significant adjunct to the teaching, and Professor Carpenter and his colleagues have made every effort to see that each historical period is represented.

It is difficult to single out particular works of art among our possessions for special mention, but any collection having within it some fifteen Winslow Homers, two Gilbert Stuarts, a Copley, a Raeburn, two Blackburns, two Child Hassams, a Utrillo, a Corot, three Andrew Wyeths, some lovely Greek and Etruscan sculpture and pottery, sculpture by Zorach, Noguchi, and Renoir, to mention only a very few, is a distinguished one.

This collection attained its excellence largely through the devoted efforts of the Friends of Art at Colby. A great many individuals have worked unendingly to help us. It is exceedingly fitting that the gallery in the Bixler Art and Music Center is named for Edith and Ellerton Jette, whose devotion to the college has been manifest in a number of ways, none more dramatic than in their active support of the program of the Friends of Art.

Through the Jette Gallery we are able to bring to the students and to our community each year opportunities to view not only our own

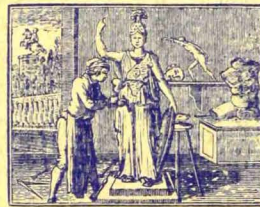
art program. This exhibition was followed the past summer by the notably successful *Maine: 100 Artists of the 20th Century*. The Archives of Maine Art established at Colby will be a definitive source of material for art historians for years to come.

IN THE REALM OF MUSIC, OUR growth has also been exciting. Here, too, what began as a one-man department now consists of three full-time faculty members and several part-time assistants. We are proud to have the Colby Community Symphony Orchestra, under Dr. Ermanno Comporetto's direction, and the ensemble groups in strings and brass that emerge from it for special occasions. The Glee Club and Concert Choir, conducted by Professor Peter Re, have not only enriched our musical lives at home but have received splendid reviews on their trips to New York and elsewhere. The Chapel Choir provides good music for the Sunday services. For the past few springs the Glee Club and the Waterville Area Community Chorus have offered a major choral work in the Fieldhouse, including the Berlioz and Brahms *Requiems* and the Mozart *Grand Mass in C*.

A devoted group of interested people under the chairmanship of Mrs. John McGowan of Waterville has formed the Colby Music Associates. They have developed a music series that has brought to Colby such distinctive artists as the Juilliard String Quartet, the Pro Musica singers, Grant Johannesen, and many others. The patrons, sponsors, and subscribers to this series have increased in number each year, and enthusiasm for its continuation is high.

One of the most recent musical developments at Colby is the founding of the Summer School of Music under the direction of Professor Re. In 1963 we were fortunate

Awards, Grants, Gifts

From the Countway Charitable Foundation of Boston, a grant of \$100,000 to establish an endowment in support of sabbatical leaves. To be known as the Francis A. and Sanda Countway Sabbatical Program Endowment, it honors the memory of the former president of Lever Brothers and of his sister. In calling the grant "an imaginative gift", President Strider said: "We are grateful for it and we congratulate the trustees of the Countway Foundation for their vision."

From International Business Machines Corporation of New York, a grant of \$50,000 in support of the mathematics program. "This splendid grant will enable the college to provide still more advanced instruction," the president said, "and help us give more individual attention to promising students." Last year all senior mathematics majors scored among the top 34 percent nationally on the graduate record examination advanced test.

From The Travelers Insurance Company of Hartford, an award of \$600 based on the number of alumni employed by the firm. "You are insuring more able leadership as today's college students become tomorrow's constructive citizens" Dr. Strider stated in accepting the gift.

From Mr. and Mrs. Sam Feinstein of Miami Beach, a gift of land on Great Pond adjoining the adult education center, and thus expanding that facility used in conjunction with the summer institutes, courses and special schools.

Lectures

ON PARENTS WEEKEND, ATTENDED BY SOME 1300 mothers and fathers, David McCord read and discussed 'light poetry' — the often archly humorous playing with words and concepts that has enticed major and minor poets into some of their most telling work. Mr. McCord — a poet, essayist, painter, and for 37 years director of the Harvard University Fund, poked gentle fun at sacred cows during his talk, and read both his work and the work of other writers dedicated to the death of euphemism, cant, and self-righteousness. We are especially fond of one line (from Mr. McCord's poem *Gloss*), which, in speaking of man, refers to him as being neither "intro nor extro but just plain vert."

A TWO-LECTURE SERIES ON WOMAN'S ROLE IN society, brought Dean Barbara Miller Solomon of Radcliffe and author (*The Feminine*

Mystique) Betty Friedan to the campus in October. Mrs. Solomon, in detailing a history of the achievement of rights by women, noted that in looking back "we see that what was freedom for one generation became conventional for the next. Always a minority has striven beyond the prevailing pattern for womanhood." For today and the future, the director of Women's Archives at Radcliffe, stated: "We need women doing different things at different times in their lives. We need men and women who accept different images of both sexes. Perhaps in time we won't have to talk about women as a special category, just as we don't talk about the changing status of men. At least not yet!"

Mrs. Friedan, before a capacity audience in Runnals Union, asserted that the one thing that stands in women's way is the false image — the feminine mystique and self-denigration that it perpetuates. "We can no longer live in the housewife image of our mothers," she said, commenting that longer life spans delegate childbearing and motherhood to "a small part of life."

"Feminine backlash" was the term Mrs. Friedan used to describe women alone in a professional area usually reserved for men; they are so thankful to be there they do not assert themselves, she said, or are fearful that other women will enter the field and cause them to lose their distinction. Women, generally, Mrs. Friedan remarked, are "so unsure of who or what (they) want that they can easily be brainwashed by such things as the communications media."



Mrs. Camp

Trustee

Mrs. Frederic E. Camp of East Bluehill has been elected to the board of trustees. A graduate of Smith College, Mrs. Camp is director of the Vocational Advisory Service (New York City) and serves on the board of directors of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society and of its Maine chapter. Since 1960 she has been vice chairman of the latter.

Mrs. Camp is a director of the Bluehill Hospital and for the past nine years has been a trustee of the Nightingale-Bamford School in New York City.

Her late husband served on the board for 20 years. On his retirement in 1961, he was elected an honorary trustee, the first to be named in the college's history. Dr. Camp died on December 16, 1963, at the age of 59.

A daughter, Catharine, graduated last June and a son, Nicholas, was a member of the class of 1960.

Sorority

DELTA DELTA DELTA SORORITY IS ENDING ITS 56-year association with the college. Mrs. J. L. Perry, Jr., of Nashville, Tenn., national president and spokesman for the sorority, informed Colby that the withdrawal will be immediate. The action follows a vote by the Colby board of trustees on November 4, 1961, and reaffirmed a year later, that the board is "strongly opposed" to discrimination by fraternities and sororities in the selection of members. A deadline of June, 1965, was set, prior to which fraternities and sororities at Colby "must satisfy the board that they have the right to select their members without regard to race, religion, or national origin."

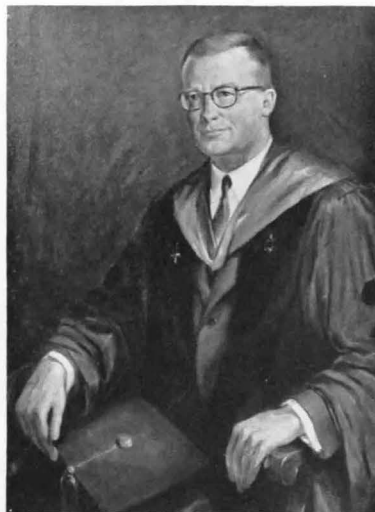
In a letter to President Strider, Mrs. Perry stated that, although "Tri Delta does not have, and has never had, a discriminatory clause," the decision of the national sorority was necessary because the college's "criteria for fraternity operations cannot be reconciled with our organization." She added that "we are forced to conclude that Colby desires to have strictly local groups, which have no relationships with national organizations."

President Strider replied that "our criteria are not designed to support an insistence upon complete local autonomy (but) to prevent discrimination on the basis of race, religion, or national origin in the selection of new members . . ."

Members of the sorority have christened a new group Delta Alpha Upsilon, and will continue as a local organization.

To be fair is not enough any more, we must be ferociously fair . . . We seem to have lost something: a spirit of independence, a spirit of our own ferocity, that has made us captive to the press release and the gentlemanly code of going to great lengths to avoid embarrassing anyone.

Lovejoy Convocation honors John Hay Whitney

BECOMING THE THIRTEENTH LOVEJOY FELLOW AT the convocation honoring the press martyr's memory, John Hay Whitney, editor and publisher of THE NEW YORK HERALD TRIBUNE, continued on the obligations of the press: "To take a stand in an embattled culture and make sense of it all . . . to cut through the junk in the public mind by seeking the order that underlies the clutter of small events; to winnow out of the apparent what is the real."

Mr. Whitney, who received an honorary LL.D., was cited for his "skillful and courageous direction of one of our nation's great newspapers." A former ambassador to England, he assumed the responsibility of leading the newspaper in 1961; since that time he has had the TRIBUNE format changed (by designer Peter Palazzo) so that more use is made of photographs and capsule presentations of news stories. The effect has been, especially in the Sunday edition, to present a magazine-like approach — without pre-digested thinking.

In his address, Challenges and Excellences, Mr. Whitney referred to journalism's pride as the "annotator of instant history," but cautioned against an easy slip into "meaningless mediocrity." Smaller countries and older civilizations might take accepted ideas of life and, translating them into terms shared by all, make them applicable to each citizen. . . . But we are a huge nation, a continent wide but sometimes incredibly narrow. Our common denominators seem to get lower and more common as time passes so that the public mind, the generalities that help us understand each other, is full of trivia, impersonal, cold. It deals with masses, not men. It doesn't enlighten, it just communicates.

"The creative arts of our day are experimenting now with a way of dealing with this scene. The Picasso that hangs on my library wall is not a generation ahead of the painting we saw when I was a boy. It is a century ahead. Our music began leaping forward



years ago. The drama that was once contained in neat settings and careful plots is shifting into new forms. We are testing out ways of the novel today that didn't exist in 1940. And where these things have gone, newspapers as a creative craft must follow . . ."

Warning that the newspapers could slide "in to the stagnation of stopping sheets, throwaways and the junior partner of television," Mr. Whitney stated that the calling of newspapers and poetry alike was "to take the language and using the matter at hand, speak to the mind and heart of individual men." He concluded: "I think that the ignorant armies have always been with us and I believe, as a passionate, personal thing, that joy and love and light exist here. Perhaps it would be hard for someone for a lifetime associated only with newspapers to recognize or then to boast that newspapers have within them the capability to write real poetry of everyday life. Perhaps, too, I am a square in a hip world. But I think that in our present problems lies future greatness. I know that I have a newspaper reaching slowly forward along this path. I believe that together we see a profession that can accept its challenges and make them excellences."

At the Associated Press editor's meeting preceding the Lovejoy Convocation, Relman

Morin, twice winner of the Pulitzer Prize (for Korean War and Little Rock race rioting reports), commented on the election, asserting that because of the ticket-splitting widely evident on November 3, "The American society and the two-party system have benefited greatly . . . this campaign made the voters think, something which recent elections have failed to do."

Scholarship Program

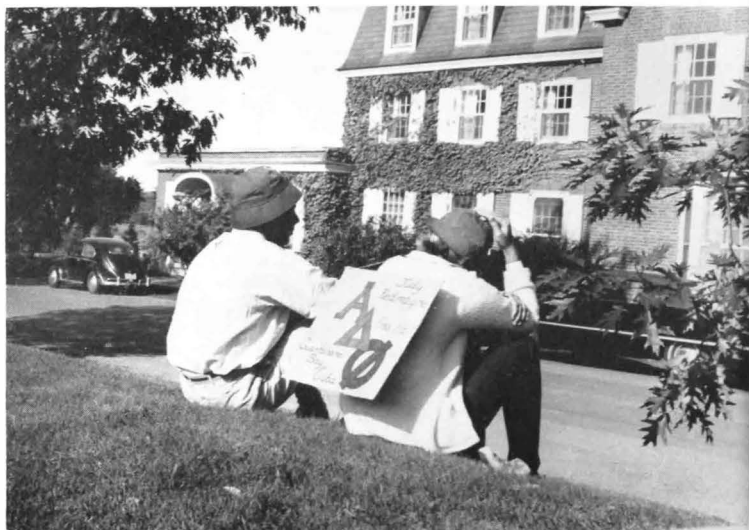
ONE OF THIRTY EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS PARTICIPATING in a new Latin American scholarship program, the college will cooperate in bringing a group of Colombian students to this country for study in the fall of 1965. Similar to the African scholarship program with which Colby is affiliated, the new program will be initiated with a single country. The African program, which began with 24 Nigerian students in 1960, now brings some 250 African students from 29 countries to the United States each fall for four years of study. Through participation, Colby has had students representing Kenya, Tanganyika, Sierra Leone, the Ivory Coast and Cameroun.

NEWS ASSISTANT EARL SMITH HAD TWO PHOTOGRAPHS in an exhibition of award-winners sponsored by the University Photographers Association and currently on a nationwide circuit; Earl's photograph of John Hay Whitney at the Lovejoy Convocation was used by TIME in their report on the occasion.

State Senator PAUL SIMON of Troy, Illinois, was a recent visitor; his biography of Elijah Parish Lovejoy had been published by Concordia Publishing House of St. Louis. 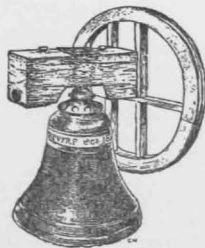

nate to have the Juilliard String Quartet in residence as faculty for the first summer of this School. They gave advanced instruction in strings and in ensemble playing to a very select group of unusually well qualified students of all ages. In the summer of 1964 we were able to secure the services of the Hungarian String Quartet, and we are happy to say that they are returning for the summer of 1965. It seems to us that a Summer School of Music of such merit will unquestionably have a beneficent influence on the distinction of our total musical offering over the years.

WHEN ONE THINKS OF THE ARTS, most people think first of art and music. I should point out that these are not the only areas of interest in the arts at Colby. Dramatic productions, for example, have a lengthy history at Colby, and we have reason to be proud of the productions each year of Powder and Wig, our dramatic society. Under the direction of Professor Irving Suss the society has brought us not only wide variety but a consistently high quality of performance and

production, whether it is Lorca, Saroyan, Shaw, or *Guys and Dolls*. The society has presented original plays written by both students and faculty, and actors and actresses emerge from all the segments of our community — students, faculty, faculty wives, and even, incredibly, an occasional administrator! Several courses in the drama as well as one in the development of the theater are offered by the English Department.

In 1959 our offerings in the arts were expanded by the addition of an instructor in the dance, a step that initiated a program of modern dance as an art form. Many of our students, both men and women, have shown interest in it, and the annual performances of the Modern Dance Club have attracted an ever growing audience.

Other aspects of the arts at Colby deserve more mention than I can devote to them here. For instance, the Rare Book Room, with its beautiful volumes and its unusual collections of manuscripts, particularly distinctive in the works of Edwin Arlington Robinson, Thomas Hardy, Sarah Orne Jewett, and the writers of the modern Irish Renaissance, is a mecca for stu-

dents, faculty, and visiting scholars who are attracted by our treasures. The Colby Graphic Arts Workshop has enabled a number of students to learn techniques of printing, typesetting, and allied graphic processes, and, under the leadership of Mr. Ian Robertson, to develop imaginative designs in this demanding field. An organization called Film Direction has brought to Colby significant productions of the cinema from the very beginning of that art form to the present, and Mr. Abbott Meader of the art department has occasionally found it possible to give instruction to students in the art of film making, a skill at which he is himself adept.

To sum it up, I should say that the state of the arts at Colby is a healthy one. More and more students interest themselves in what is offered in these realms. The January Program of Independent Study offers an unusual opportunity to students who wish to explore the arts on their own, in varying degrees of intensity. We are fortunate that the rich collections and facilities at Colby afford students who have such enterprise a fine opportunity to develop their own original views and release their own creative talents.

SPORTS

EARL SMITH

Coach John Simpson had forty-five out for early football practice, the largest squad in the past decade. But the season, viewed only from the won-loss record, was a disappointment. After dropping four straight, the Mules copped their single win in eight starts by nipping Trinity, 14-13.

The fall campaign marked the end of the State Series, Maine's oldest football tradition which began in 1893. Both Bates and Bowdoin have withdrawn from competition with the University of Maine.

In all, football fans saw four-hundred-and-sixteen Series contests. The 1914 Colby eleven, which the alumni honored at its Homecoming reunion, was the highest scoring team in history. That squad outpointed its rivals 123-0 by drubbing Bates, 61-0; Bowdoin, 48-0; and Maine, 14-0.

The final Series was a turnabout for Colby which lost all three games. Scores were as follows: Norwich, 19-43; Coast Guard, 0-22; Tufts, 12-43; Springfield, 18-20; Trinity, 14-13; Bowdoin, 6-32; Maine, 7-42; Bates, 6-23. A classy Maine eleven was the eventual Series champion.

The freshman squad, under coach Verne Ullom, had but three contests. The single 12-7 win over the Maine freshmen marked the first Baby Mule victory over the Bear Cubs since 1958. Losses were to Bridgton, 6-33, and Bowdoin, 14-26.

Pete Wagner, a junior from Hampton Falls, N. H., has been elected by his teammates to captain the 1965 team. The former All-New Hampshire back from Exeter High School was also selected as the team's Most Valuable Player

and received the coveted Herbert Wadsworth Award. Bill Rynne, a junior from Watertown, Mass., received the Paul "Ginger" Fraser Award as the most improved non-letterman.

Two former Waterville area high school football captains were named honorary captains of the freshman squad. Joe Jabar, who captained the Waterville High team, and Dick Libby, who headed Lawrence High of Fairfield, were elected titular heads of the Baby Mule squad.

Soccer, fathered and pushed to prominence in the State of Maine by Colby's own Gilbert "Mike" Loeb, was given another boost in popularity in the fall when Mule kickers retained the State Series crown, established last year to honor Loeb.

Under coach John Winkin, the squad finished with a 9-2-1 record overall and a 5-0-1 mark in state competition. Retiring captain David Kelley of Princeton, N. J. received the Colby Loeb Award as the team's most valuable player for the second straight year and was again selected to the All-Maine team. For the first time he received All-New England honors. The Mules landed three others on the All-Maine squad: Goalie Brad Coady of Canton, Mass., fullback Starbuck Smith of Cincinnati, Ohio, and halfback Terry Eagle of New York City.

Elected co-captains of next year's team were Eagle and Richard Zimmerman of Sea Cliff, N. Y. In six seasons of formal soccer play, Colby teams have won 47, lost eight and tied four.

This year's record: Springfield, 0-3; Babson, 6-1; Rhode Island, 7-1; Brandeis, 4-1; Boston University, 3-1; Norwich, 0-3; Maine, 6-2; Bowdoin, 4-1; Bates, 2-1; Maine, 4-0; Bowdoin, 3-2; Bates, 1-1.

The freshman squad won three of four, topping Hinckley, 2-0; Bowdoin, 1-0, and M. C. I., 2-1. The single loss was to Kents Hill, 3-5.

No word can adequately embrace Dunn's contribution to the college she served so devotedly as alumna, teacher, trustee and benefactor. Her counsel and her intelligence impressed upon Colby a need to maintain fundamental value and to seek fundamental goals. She was, in the words of President Strider, "one of the great ladies of Colby history."

Miss Dunn died on September 11, 1964, at the age of 88. She had graduated from Colby in 1896 with the highest honors, *summa cum laude*, and was one of the earliest members of the Colby chapter of Phi Beta Kappa. After several years spent in teaching at the local high school, securing a master's degree at Radcliffe, studying library science, working in the Waterville Public Library as a young assistant, and helping the State Librarian

organize libraries all over Maine, Miss Dunn was called to the Colby faculty by President Roberts, who had himself been her inspiring teacher of English. When Miss Dunn retired from teaching in 1934, she had risen to the rank of full professor, and the trustees immediately recognized her worth by making her a member of the board.

Florence Dunn's devotion to Colby began early in her life. Her father had graduated from the college in 1868, and her grandfather had been a benefactor in the early, struggling days. Her mother, an author of national repute, had been awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Letters in 1906. Miss Dunn was brought up almost literally on the college campus in the family homestead that stood across



College Avenue from the president's home.

During her years as faculty member and trustee, as well as when she was what she liked to call "just plain alumna," Miss Dunn stood at the forefront of the small band of Colby women who finally won the long struggle for equal recognition of the women's division. As Judge Cornish once said, "Miss Dunn can fight for the girls without making a nuisance of herself." She was long the recognized, valiant right hand of Colby's revered dean of women, Ninetta Runnals.

Few Colby women have engaged in so many activities or received so many honors. She was influential in forming a national organization from her local sorority, Sigma Kappa, and she served as the first grand president. For nearly fifty years she was a trustee of the Waterville Public Library and a critically valuable member of its book selection committee. Like her mother, she was a writer, especially of poetry, and in

one of Colby's great ladies

1928 she received from Colby the same honor that had been conferred upon her mother, the degree of doctor of letters. She served as president of the local chapter of AAUW, officiated at the cornerstone layings for Louise Coburn and Mary Low halls and of the Runnals Union and was awarded a Colby brick.

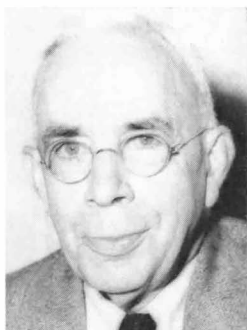
In recognition of her benefactions, after pointing out her achievements as student and teacher, President Strider said: "Her devotion and generosity have made possible many important improvements, and Colby will always stand in her debt. We shall remember her with gratitude and admiration."

Florence Dunn splendidly exemplified her favorite verse from the Bible: "They shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint."

1899

A great career was honored this year when the Henry Russell Spencer Conference Room was dedicated at Ohio State University. Named for the 1899 Colby graduate — a distinguished historian, political scientist and author—the room is tangible recognition of Dr. Spencer's long tenure as a faculty member, and as founder and, for thirty-eight years, chairman of the department of political science at that institution.

The Spencer Room, used for seminars and discussion groups, is also an informal gathering place for graduate and advanced undergraduate students, who have the chance, from time to time, to meet and talk with the professor emeritus himself. Dr. Spencer, now in his mid-eighties, comes to the campus nearly every day.

Elected to Phi Beta Kappa (he is a charter member of the Ohio State chapter), Dr. Spencer was a debater, glee club member, hurdler on the track team and college organizer. He will soon mark his seventieth year of affiliation with Delta Kappa Epsilon.

From Colby he went to Columbia University, taking his master's and doctor's degrees. After teaching at Coburn Classical Institute, which he had attended, Dr. Spencer joined the Ohio State faculty in 1903. His forty-six year career there was interrupted only twice: during 1906-7 he was preceptor in history at Princeton and, during the first world war, served with the YMCA in France and Italy.

Prior to his retirement in 1949, Dr. Spencer was elected president of the American Political Science Association—an office previously held by such men as James Bryce, Woodrow Wilson, Charles Merriam, and Charles

A. Beard. He has written two books: *GOVERNMENT AND POLITICS OF ITALY* (1932) and *GOVERNMENT AND POLITICS ABROAD* (1936) and contributed a chapter on Mussolini to *DICTATORSHIP IN THE MODERN WORLD*. During the summers he has taught at Columbia, UCLA, Stanford, Reed College, West Virginia, and Tulane.

A colleague of Dr. Spencer's, Dean of the Faculties Frederic Heimbarger has written: "Few persons, if any, have meant more to Ohio State and to some of us personally than has Henry Russell Spencer . . . (he is a remarkable guide and teacher." Formally recognizing this, the university made him an honorary doctor of laws in 1950. And, the same year, Colby awarded a LITT.D. to her distinguished alumnus.

President Strider has frequently called on Dr. Spencer when he has been in the Columbus area, and on those occasions they have always gone together for a brief visit with Dr. Spencer's older brother, Dr. Charles W. Spencer of the class of 1890, who is an invalid but, when he is feeling well, a lively conversationalist. President Strider has said that he has learned more about the pre-twentieth century Colby from his talks with these two alumni than he could possibly have learned from any other firsthand source. Dr. Henry Spencer and President Strider have carried on a considerable correspondence for a number of years, and much that is significant in Colby history has been illuminated in Dr. Spencer's letters. The president is a particular admirer of Dr. Spencer's epistolary style.

When Bob Marden '50 banged down the gavel Sept. 30 to adjourn the Maine Senate he ended — at least temporarily — the most promising career in Maine politics. Marden's decision to leave politics in order to devote full time to his law practice also leaves a void in the leadership of a loosely knit band of young moderate Republicans who have been attempting to remake the image of the GOP in Maine.

It has been around Senate President Robert A. Marden of Waterville that most of the progressive Republicans in the Maine Legislature gathered during the last four years. And most of them saw in him their candidate for governor in 1966 or 1970.

Marden was propelled to leadership of the younger element of the Maine

GOP by acclamation rather than through any doing of his own. His supporters admit they nagged him for months before he would consent to run for the Senate presidency in 1963.

The son of Harold Chesterfield Marden '21, a prominent Waterville attorney and now a member of the State Supreme Court, Marden was graduated from Colby College and Boston University Law School. He had his first brush with county-wide politics when he ran for Kennebec County attorney prior to running successfully for the State Senate.

In a brief, closing message to his Senate colleagues, Marden made a touchingly simple closing statement; in thanking the Senate for its tribute to him he said: "I'm reminded of the words of a folk tune my children and I sing as we travel."

*When I first came into this land,
I was not a wealthy man;

I named my ax, 'Don't Relax,'
But the land was sweet and good
And I did what I could.*

Writing about Dr. Frederick T. Hill is a difficult assignment. A skeletal sketch provokes his friends — quick to point out awards, honors and achievements omitted; a detailed account provokes the subject who is wont to grumble about efforts “to annoy” him.

Dr. Hill reached the three-quarter century mark in June. It's the only task he has ever performed in less than one hundred per cent measure. During the last seventy-five years he graduated from Colby College and Harvard Medical School — *cum laude*. He earned an international reputation as an otolaryngologist, founded a hospital, served as a Colby trustee, pioneered innumerable health programs for Waterville particularly and Maine generally, wrote extensively about his own specialty and hospital organization, and made himself beloved as a teacher. Colby gave him an honorary degree in 1936 and the University of Maine gave him one in 1952.

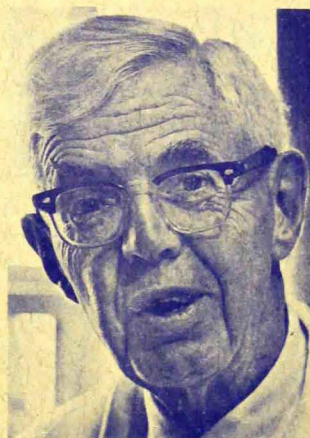
In September 1963, Dr. Hill retired as medical director of Thayer Hospital, becoming vice president of planning and development. This work and his private practice are conducted in an office lined with citations for professional excellence and mementos from patients grateful for the kindness of one human being to another.

There are paintings, carvings and a homemade caricature doll of a physician — gifts of love and respect made by people who know that the personal effort he devotes to his patients can only be repaid in kind.

After residency at the Massachusetts Eye and Ear Infirmary and service in the Army Medical Corps during World War I, Dr. Hill returned to his native Waterville to practice the only kind of medicine he recognizes: the best. He set his standards, accepted the discipline to maintain them, and the risks involved in their defense. “There is only one way to coast,” he reminds laurel-resters, “downhill.”

Dr. Hill is presently a member of ten medical societies, three hospital associations, four government advisory and planning councils, and he is consultant in otolaryngology to nine Maine hospitals. He can do all this because he has never put a premium on his time. He is available to anyone with a problem — whether a hospital administrator looking for advice on an expansion program or a hospital employee looking for advice on some detail of his job.

Dr. Hill has received the Newcomb and DeRoaldes awards of the American Laryngological Association and the Modern Hospital Award. He has been president of the American Otological Society and the New England Hospital Assembly. All this adds up to another of his unique achievements: skill both as physician and hospital mentor.



“Doctors are educated in depth, rather than breadth,” he often explains, “and one of the unfortunate things in the average medical school curriculum is that little or nothing is available to the student to acquaint him with the complexities and the problems of the institution in which he will probably spend two-thirds of his professional career.”

He made the acquaintance of these complexities and problems in 1931, when he and five other physicians founded Thayer in a converted Waterville residence. Thayer has since acquired a national reputation for the quality of its medical care and calibre of its medical staff.

Of all the institutions, associations and societies which lay claim to Dr. Hill, only one really competes with Thayer for his affections: Colby College. He saw both outgrow their original homesteads and move to new; he helped both reset their sights on wider horizons of modern medicine and modern education.

In 1947 he wrote: “The new Colby envisions more than merely a new campus on Mayflower Hill. It has accepted the principle that it should be interested not only in providing the best type of liberal education for young people, but that persons outside the college age are also within the scope of its activities.” The principle was his. Colby put it into practice and is now famous for its adult education program.

Dr. Hill is a prophet who has been received in his own generation — and he's still way ahead of the present one. For this Yankee from Olympus, the future's the thing.

Three graduates of the class of 1963, and one from 1959, are new members of the Peace Corps. Robert Younes '59 of Brooklyn lists Tunisia as his new address, serving as a physician to the volunteers as well as doing volunteer work himself.

Frances Jones is a member of the group concentrating on control, treatment and prevention of tuberculosis in the new African nation of Malawi. Her training at Harvard and North Carolina included public health techniques, the Bantu language, U. S. institutions and world affairs, and Malawian history and culture.

Turkey is attempting to educate

more of its citizens in the English language; Joan Carol Baxter joined 91 volunteers in September to instruct in the secondary schools of smaller Turkish towns. Intensive instruction in Turkish was a feature of Joan's training at Portland State University in Oregon.

A volunteer group of forty, including Edmund Field, have left for Chile to work on projects in forest improvement, agricultural extension, and community development in that country's rural areas. Indoctrination training in Spanish, Chilean history and culture, American history and institutions was held at North Carolina University.

1894

Frances Horton Morrill, 91, died on July 28 in Waterville. A teacher for thirty-five years in Winslow and Waterville, she was born in Canaan. A member of Sigma Kappa, Miss Morrill was one of the first Colby initiates into Phi Beta Kappa, receiving that honor the year the local chapter was established (1894).

She taught at Waterville High School until 1915, and at Winslow High School until 1929. Recipient of an MA from Colby in 1897, she remained interested in the college affairs throughout her life and was a generous helper and benefactor. Miss Morrill leaves a niece and a nephew, Dr. Morrill Ilsley '17.



1903

Caleb Albert Lewis, 84, died on July 1 in Waterville. The "editor of bygone days" had been general and business manager, managing editor and editor of the *WATERVILLE MORNING SENTINEL* during a thirty-six year career; and his column *Seeing and Believing* appeared regularly from 1929 until 1963. Born in Winn, he prepared at Coburn Classical Institute. A vigorous campaigner for his beliefs, Mr. Lewis was influential in the program to keep Colby in Waterville during the 1930's.

A member of Delta Upsilon, Mr. Lewis was associate editor of the *ORACLE*, manager and editor of the *ECHO*, an athlete (he played baseball with Jack Coombs), and a student assistant in chemistry. He joined the *SENTINEL* in 1903, leaving in 1906, and returning nine years later as manager. Mr. Lewis served as alderman, councilman, and city auditor, and had been president of Kiwanis, the chamber of commerce, and Kennebec Savings and Loan Company.

Mr. Lewis was once described as having the "drive of the editor portrayed in the newspaper novel plus the enthusiasm and eagerness to champion anything which might brighten and improve his beloved . . . morning paper." Awarded a Colby Brick in 1954, he had written a number of columns and editorials stressing the economic and cultural importance of Colby to the city of Waterville.

IN MEMORIAM

Mr. Lewis leaves his wife, Minnie, a sister, and two daughters, *Muriel Baker '28* and *Marion '32*.

1909

Marion Wadsworth Long, 76, died on August 23 in Camden. Born in that town and educated at the local high school, she was a member of Sigma Kappa at Colby.

Mrs. Long served as secretary to the board of trustees of Camden Public Library for 28 years. She is survived by nieces and cousins.

1914

Frederick Harold Dubord, 72, died on October 14 in Waterville. Retired associate justice of the Maine Supreme Judicial Court, he had been mayor of Waterville for five terms and for sixteen years Democratic National Committeeman.

A native of Waterville, he prepared at the local high school; at Colby he was active in dramatics and music and was a member of Lambda Chi Alpha. He studied law at the University of Maine and Boston University, receiving his LLB (as well as an honorary LLD, 1960) from the latter in 1922. He practiced with the law firm of Dubord and Dubord, and at the time of his death was associated with Marden, Dubord, Bernier and Chandler.

Unsuccessful in bids for the governorship and a senate seat, Judge Dubord served as city treasurer, city clerk and auditor. He campaigned vigorously for Democratic candidates and made an intensive effort to swing the state behind President Roosevelt. In 1934 he narrowly missed election to the U. S. Senate, losing in a close race to Frederick Hale. Judge Dubord was appointed to the bench in 1955, serving until 1962 when he reached the mandatory retirement age.



He received many honors during his long political and judicial career. He was appointed as one of the three members of the United States Commission for the celebration of the two hundredth anniversary of Thomas Jefferson's birth. Trustee of the public library and Thayer Hospital, and member of many Bar Associations, including the Bar of the U. S. Supreme Court, Judge Dubord was a director of the Waterville Savings Bank and had served on the alumni council. It was during his tenure as mayor that he headed the citizen's committee which obtained and presented to Colby the Mayflower Hill tract. Once called "a man of keen and very deep justice," he was awarded an honorary LLD by Colby last June. The citation stated: "You have shown in all your career a profound respect for the symmetry of law and the far-reaching implications of each case and each decision . . . your contribution to your community have been immense."

Judge Dubord is survived by his wife, Blanche, two sons, a daughter *Elizabeth Goulette '55*, a brother, a half-brother, and his stepmother.

1912

Arthur Lindley Horne, 74, died on August 28 in Portland. A native of Fairfield, he attended Lawrence High School, and was a member of Phi Delta Theta, attending Colby for two years. A well-known consulting engineer in Maine, he had been associated with the corps of engineers at Dow and at Limestone Air Force Bases. Recently he had been employed by the Brewer Manufacturing Company in Old Town, retiring three years ago.

Mr. Horne leaves his wife, Bessie, two daughters, two sons, and a sister, *Marion Kennison '18*.

1916

Robert Augustine Hussey, 70, died on July 16 in State College, Pennsylvania. Born in North Berwick, he prepared at Oak Grove Seminary; at Colby he was on the track team and was football manager. Mr. Hussey was a member of Alpha Tau Omega.

After service in the army medical corps, he worked in supervisory positions with Jones and Laughlin Steel Corporations and Hussey Manufacturing Company. Recipient of his MA from Pennsylvania State University in 1936, Mr. Hussey served on the faculty at that institution for 26 years, rising to the rank of full professor. Upon his retirement in 1955, he accepted a posi-

tion teaching industrial engineering at the University of Puerto Rico, and subsequently worked as a senior engineer for a State College firm and taught at Virginia Polytechnic Institute. Business Manager of Penn State's Ordnance Research Laboratory for ten years, Mr. Hussey was the author of publications dealing with costs and management of research facilities. He had served also as a board member of Centre County Hospital in Bellefonte (Pa.) and as chairman of the zoning adjustment board in State College.

Mr. Hussey leaves his daughter and two brothers, *Phillip* and *Rowland* '13.

Norman Luther Stevens, 70, died on August 9 in Boston. He was born in West Haven, Connecticut, and educated at Hebron Academy. Retired for six years, he had served for many years as an engineer for the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company, and had resided in Wollaston (Mass.) since 1923. He was a member of Masonic lodges in Maine and New York.

Mr. Stevens leaves his wife, *Lillian*.

1918

Margaret Wilkins Hickman, 66, died on August 27 in Buffalo, New York. Former dean at Buffalo Seminary, she was praised by one of her students in an editorial on her retirement as "a woman of boundless wisdom and unequalled teaching ability."

Born in Houlton, she prepared at Ricker Classical Institute. Active in the YWCA at Colby, she was a member of Sigma Kappa; she earned her MA from Columbia University in 1925. Mrs. Hickman began her career at Buffalo Seminary in 1925 as chairman of the mathematics department; she had previously taught in Hampstead and Exeter (N. H.) and Taunton, Massachusetts. She became dean of the Seminary in 1952, retiring ten years later. Mrs. Hickman had spent one year in Edinburgh, Scotland, as an exchange teacher.

An accomplished weaver, she had served as president of the Niagara Frontier Weavers Guild. She leaves her husband, a sister, and two brothers, one of whom is *Robert* '20.

1921

Stanley Neil Shibles, 68, died on June 8 in Sarasota, Florida. A native of Rockport, he became principal of the Ellsworth school system following his graduation. Later superintendent of schools at Portage Lake, Mr. Shibles

then moved to Connecticut where he owned and operated Shibles' Cabins and a retail produce market in Glastonbury for more than thirty years. He retired in 1961, moving to Sarasota.

He leaves two sons and a sister.

1922

Clifford Lorenzo Peaslee, 67, died on June 11 in Pittsfield, Massachusetts. Born in that city and educated at the local high school, he was a member of Lambda Chi Alpha; he did graduate study at Union Theological Seminary and Columbia University, receiving his BD and MA respectively from those institutions.

Ordained in 1925, the Reverend Peaslee was assistant pastor at the First Baptist Church in Pittsfield and served as minister in Belfast for eleven years. He retired in 1938 after a three year pastorate in Ashland, New Hampshire. The Reverend Peaslee was active in veteran's work and, an accomplished organist, instructed and played in various hospitals.

He leaves two brothers and a sister.

Theodore Crie Bramhall, 64, died in Sarasota, Florida, on September 1. Born in Belfast, he was a member of Delta Upsilon, and belonged to the Musical Club, serving as manager for several years. Recipient of an MD from Harvard in 1928, Dr. Bramhall interned in Boston hospitals, and was a house surgeon at the Free Hospital for Women in Brookline.

Returning to Maine, Dr. Bramhall opened an office for the practice of surgery in Portland in 1931, later limiting his practice to gynecology and obstetrics. Dr. Bramhall was appointed city physician for Portland and superintendent of Farrington Hospital from 1931 to 1937 and served as chief gynecologist at Maine Medical Center until his retirement in 1955. The author of articles in medical journals, he was director of Associated Hospital Service of Maine for four years.

Dr. Bramhall leaves his wife, *Elinor*, a son and a daughter, and his brother, *Ralph* '15.

Robert Leroy Jacobs, Sr., 63, died on August 10 in North Edgcomb. A native of Sydney, he prepared at Oak Grove Seminary; he served as manager of the Echo and was president of Alpha Tau Omega. Harry Burnham Thomas, 58, died on November 3 in Keyport, New Jersey. A member of the board of trustees since 1953, he had served as chairman of the alumni fund, class agent, and director of special gifts phase of the Annual Fund for Continuing Achievement.

Born in Houlton, Mr. Thomas was a member of Lambda Chi Alpha, and was influential in the construction of the chapter house. Store manager and then district manager for J. J. Newberry Company, he opened his own firm in Keyport in 1938. At the time of his death he was president of the H. B. Thomas Company, a chain of retail stores, and chairman of the board of directors of the Peoples National Bank. Mr. Thomas served one two-year term as a councilman in Keyport, and was a director of the Variety Stores and New Jersey Retail Associations, a trustee of the public library, and past president of the Kiwanis Club.

Recipient of an honorary MA from Colby, Mr. Thomas was cited in an editorial in the Keyport Weekly as a "man who gave good counsel and could accept counsel." As a member of the library board, he "constantly strived to increase the facilities at the library for the educational and cultural benefit of both children and adults." President Strider, in expressing sorrow on behalf of the college, stated "Those of us at Colby who knew Harry Thomas are grieved. . . A native of Houlton who went on from Colby to make good in the business world, he never forgot his college and his native state. He was a devoted trustee . . . and we shall miss him."

Mr. Thomas leaves his son.

Samuel R. Feldman, 61, died on October 3 in Springfield, Massachusetts. The prominent surgeon had been elected a trustee last June.

Dr. Feldman was born in Hartford, Connecticut, and



was a graduate of Technical High School there; a member of Tau Delta Phi, he was on the student council at Colby. Receiving his MD from Boston University Medical School in 1931, he had practiced as a surgeon in Springfield since 1937, and had opened a new office last year. Senior surgical staff member at Springfield Hospital, Dr. Feldman was a captain in the navy; during the second world war he directed construction of a 350-bed hospital on Tinian in the Marianas and was the first medical officer to train natives as nurses. He served as commander of the medical section at San Diego Naval Base during the Korean conflict. He was a fellow of the American College of Surgeons and a diplomat of the National Board of Medical Examiners.

Long active in college affairs, Dr. Feldman had been on the executive committee of the alumni council and chairman of the alumni fund. In noting his death, the board of trustees adopted a resolution which spoke of his long service to his college, his loyalty and vigor and the many friends he had earned for Colby. "That Dr. Feldman was a prominent surgeon with an extensive practice and numerous professional responsibilities," the citation read, "did not preclude his devoting countless hours to work on Colby's behalf. His loss is grievous to us and to the several organizations with which he was associated. Be it therefore resolved that the president and trustees of Colby College place on record his tribute to the life work of Samuel R. Feldman and our acknowledgement of the debt owed to him by present and future generations."

Dr. Feldman is survived by his wife, Lillian, two daughters, and four brothers, one of whom is Paul '34.

1928

P. Louis Fourcade, 59, died on August 3 in White Plains, New York. City commissioner of purchasing since 1960, he had been in government work in that community since 1929. Mr. Fourcade was born in Roslyn (N. Y.) and prepared at White Plains High School. He was a member of Delta Kappa Epsilon.

First an auditor in the city finance department and later cashier, he was appointed city marshal in 1935. He was concerned with the preservation of historic sites, was an avid outdoorsman, and had recently been elected president of the Rotary Club. In commenting on his service, the WHITE

PLAINS REPORTER-DISPATCH stated: "He served in many posts with marked distinction . . . not only was he dedicated to the service of the city he loved but was as active in community affairs as any one man could be." Mayor Richard Hendley said "I have lost a good friend."

Mr. Fourcade is survived by his wife, Georgia, his father, two daughters, one of whom is Suzanne Erskine '61, and a sister.

1929

Russell Ellis Butler, 58, died on April 13 in San Bernardino, California. A native of Hyde Park, Mass., he had lived in that city for seventeen years.

He attended Colby for two years, and was a member of Lambda Chi Alpha. Mr. Butler also studied at Gordon College of Theology in Boston, and, during World War II, served with the 297th General Hospital, England.

Mr. Butler had worked as an insurance adjuster, claims investigator, and, most recently, in sales work.

Survivors include his wife, Beatrice, a son, and two brothers.

1931

Miles Lancaster Allen, 56, died on July 11 in Phoebus, Virginia. Born in Pittsfield, he attended Waterville High School. Following his graduation from Colby he studied at National University Law School in Washington, D. C., receiving his LL.B., M.P.L., and J.D. degrees.

An attorney and investigator for the federal government until 1946, Mr. Allen opened his own office as an insurance adjuster in Southwick, Massachusetts, where he resided. He was a member of the Maine and District of Columbia Bar Associations, was a 32nd degree Mason, and was active in the Hampden County Radio League.

Mr. Allen leaves his wife, Florence, two sons, a sister, and a brother, Philip '30.

Pirates

To this day many believe that the Islands of Casco Bay have huge stores of pirate treasure buried along their shores. Names like Bold Dick Ledge, Broken Cove, David's Castle, Burnt Coat, or Witch Rock; stories still extant of the infamous pirates Dixie Bull and Captain Kidd, serve to whet the appetites of treasure seekers.

One true story concerns Great Walt Bagnall, who gained much gold by dishonest transactions with the Indians, and is thought to have buried his hoard at Richmond's Island, where he lived until killed by the very Indians he cheated. Whatever happened to Bagnall's fortune, it is a fact that in 1855, when the owner of Richmond's Island was plowing a field near the shore, an iron pot was turned up that contained gold and silver coins. Since the latest date on the coins was 1625, it may be reasonably assumed that this was part of Bagnall's loot.

Another story concerns a pirate ship that foundered on Brown Cow Ledge.

Some of the crew are supposed to have escaped to Jewell's Island with a "great chest of gold," which they buried there.

Still another legend is of Captain Kidd who, making into a cove on Jewell's Island, buried a "huge copper kettle" filled with his choicest treasure, there. One version has Kidd summarily executing the sailors who helped bury the treasure, so that only he would know the spot, which he marked with a flat stone on which he carved an inverted compass. Even today hopeful visitors to the Island search for a stone inscribed with a compass pointing south!

On Crotch (Cliff) Island lived at one time a recluse, one Captain Keiff, thought to be a smuggler and a pirate. He had an unlovely habit, so the story goes, of tying a lantern to his horse's neck during storms and riding up and down a beach lying behind treacherous reefs, to lure passing ships to their destruction. Many an unwary pilot steered his vessel onto the reefs, believing the light meant safe harbor. Keiff then salvaged the cargoes and is thought to have waxed rich on this practice.
