SOMERSET RAILROAD.—The Directors of the

Somerset Railroad Company have applied to the City Council of Lewiston for aid in the sum of \$100,000, Lewiston to exchange city bonds for first mortgage railroad bonds to that amount, to purchase iron for the thirteen miles of the road between West Waterville and Norridgewock. The City Council appointed a delegation to visit the Somerset Valley to inspect the line of the route and report upon the same. That committee have just reported that the completion of the road is of great importance to the city of Lewiston, and they recommend the City Council and citizens to take into consideration the proposition of the Directors of the Somerset road.
